THE NEW PRESS.—The Henderson Gold Leaf has just got a new cylinder printing press, of same make as the one in use in this office, and is justly proud of it. Already the Gold Leaf has an improved appearance, and when the impression comes to be properly adjusted the work will show to fuller advantage. We congratulate the Gold Leaf on the advent of its long hoped-for consummation, and the people of Henderson on increased facilities for disseminating light. The following, which Bro. Manning has to say about the job of putting up the press, sounds very much like what our boys could have said—perhaps did say—at the time that they tackled a similar job in this office years ago: A cut of our new press is shown above. We erected it ourself without the aid of an expert or book of instructions. Every piece is in its proper place and all the parts fit perfectly and work well. We have not had the benefit even of so much as the experience of a "feeder" of cylinder presses before while we have seen them in operation. This fact alone speaks for the extreme simplicity of the machine.

DURHAM STIRRUM.—The people of our goodly sister town of Durham are stirred up. The Durham and Northern Railroad obtained leave of the Commissioners to run their track up a certain street, when the authorities of the R. & D. system interfered and stopped the work.
