Like Abraham Lincoln.—It is now said of Rev. Thos. H. Dixon, who has just begun a pastorate in a church of New York city, that his striking resemblance to Abraham Lincoln will assist in making him a prominent character in the life of New York. This reminds us of an incident which occurred in Georgetown, D. C., in May 1886. The editor of this paper was a guest in a prominent family of that city, one of the members of which was a very sprightly young widow, whose conversational powers were exceedingly fine. As our acquaintance grew a little more intimate she remarked to this writer: "I have discovered in you a very striking resemblance to President Lincoln. He was perhaps the most awkwardly hung together man I ever saw." Thenceforth we were a prominent character in the drawing room of that household.
