Course of the Western Cyclone.

CHICAGO, May 7.—A dispatch from Fargo, Dak., says that a cyclone swept across that city yesterday, doing considerable damage in the way of unroofing buildings, and demoralizing telephone and electric light wires. The upper story of the Silverman block was badly damaged; the debris from which fills the street in front. The electric light tower lies across the railroad track. Numerous dwellings were unroofed. The storm moved from south to north, and was preceded by a blinding sand storm and the usual roaring sounds.

BUFFALO, Dak., May 7.—The most destructive storm ever experienced in this section, passed over the town yesterday. The storm commenced at 7 o'clock, and at 2 p. m., it assumed the form of a hurricane. The damage will foot up \$100,000.

The Woes of the West.

HUDSON, Mich., May 7.—The little village of Waldron, near here, suffered a disastrous fire yesterday. Thirty stores and houses, comprising the entire business portion of the place, were swept away. The loss will reach \$60,000, partially insured.

CLEVELAND, O., May 7.—A special to the Press from Lima, Ohio, says the entire business portion of Beaver Dam, a town near there, was destroyed by fire at an early hour this morning. But three buildings were left. Loss \$80,000.

GREENFIELD, Illa., May 7.—A severe conflagration visited this town yesterday. The entire east side of the Square, consisting of good business houses, was burned, entailing a loss of \$50,000. The fire was of incendiary origin.

PARIS, Ky., May 7.—Captain T. E. Moor's large stable, containing twelve valuable horses, burned last night. The horses were valued at nearly \$60,000.
