Greensboro has had three fires in about as many days. On yesterday evening the joint barn of Messrs. Weaver and White, was burned, thought to have taken fire from the use of a cigarette by some careless boy.

Cards are out for the marriage of Mr. Peter P. Yates to Miss Kate E. Chandler, which will take place at La Fayette Square Presbyterian church, Baltimore, Md., on Wednesday morning, October 16th, at 11 o'clock.

Mrs. Sam Bradshaw arrived here on yesterday morning from Raleigh, at which place she went to attend the marriage of Mr. Pou to Miss Annie Walker. She and Mr. Bradshaw left yesterday afternoon for their home in Asheboro.

The two fire companies, white and black, which were on opposite sides of the burning stable yesterday evening, looked as if they were trying to see which could throw the most water on the other, and were using the flames as common property to heat the water while in transit.

Several of our townsmen heard sounds yesterday evening that were produced from a novel cause—excessive heat among hogs. Some hogs that were confined in a pen near the stable that was burned, were loud in their calls for succor. They were turned out before burned.

Exodusters. —Quite a large number of white emigrants, mostly from Johnston county, reached here this morning on their way to Woodruffe county, Arkansas. We interviewed them on the train from Durham up, and found out their grievance. Johnston county lands, they said, had become greatly impoverished, and where they once fetched a bale of cotton to the acre, it would now take three to five acres to produce that quantity. Everything was mortgaged, they said; and they represented that the merchants dictated both the price of the farmers' product and of every article sold to the farmer in turn. Some of them were densely ignorant, and one of them, when asked where he got on the train, answered: "At Selamy," meaning, Selma. Another, who was inclined to be facetious, insisted that he was going away, for the Johnston county lands to have rest. They needed it, he said. We asked him what he did with his "plunder," when he was leaving home. "O," said he, "I couldn't get anything for it, and so I just broke it up and scattered it about." We asked him why he didn't dump it on the compost heap, but to this he made no reply. There were no very old people in the crowd; none over fifty, at any rate, but under that age every period seemed to be represented, even down to a babe of six weeks. The women were superior to the men, apparently, and none of them seemed to think they were on the way to the Promised Land. Reaching Burlington, we met a gentleman who had lived in Johnston county, and knew the status of the class which these exodusters represented. Said he, "If they get hold of five dollars, they will spend the larger half of it for whiskey, and besides, they are not really industrious." We judge this to be "about the size of it." Getting whiskey by moonshine in Johnston county has been set back considerably of late, and peradventure some of these exodusters are just shaking off the dust of their feet as a testimony against the United States Revenue Department. It is a curious fact that we heard from the lips of one of this company last night, without the slightest provocation, a second edition of the blasphemy belched out by the God-forsaken wretches, who went down east on the train which left here Tuesday night. As Sam Jones said last night, it would be hell enough to spend even one night in a palace with no other company than such as these.

The east wing of the Jackson, Mich., State prison was burned on the 9th inst. The origin of the fire is unknown. The loss is about 25,000. The same wing was burned a few years ago.
