FRUGALITY AND ECONOMY.

I have spoken of frugality and economy as important factors in American life. I find no fault with the accumulation of wealth, and am glad to see energy and enterprise receive their fair reward. But I believe that our Government in its natural integrity, is exactly suited to a frugal and economical people; and I believe it is safest in the hands of those who have been made strong and self-reliant in their citizenship, by self-denial and by the surroundings of an enforced economy. Thrift and careful watchfulness of expenditure among the people tend to secure a thrifty government; and cheap and careful living on the part of individuals ought to enforce economy in the public expenditures.

The foregoing is taken from the speech of Grover Cleveland at the 77th birthday anniversary of Senator Thurman, at Columbus, Ohio, Nov. 13th.

Without stopping to inquire or to express an opinion, as to whether "cheapness and economy" have been "flippantly derided" in any quarter, we would simply express admiration for the wisdom shown by the ex-President in what he says about "frugality and economy." He has simply taken in the situation as it exists with eight-tenths of the American people, and has put himself in sympathy with them. It is a fact that there has been for some time a tendency in certain quarters, without regard to party affiliations, to ignore the condition to which Mr Cleveland refers, and to live and to spend as though everybody were rich and all the poor people who had any need for frugality and economy were dead and buried. And it is also true that where there is great wealth it has not been earned except by this derided frugality and economy. In the shops and factories, in the mines and on the farms this has been the condition on which the production of wealth has been effected.

"I believe," says Mr Cleveland, "that our Government, in its natural integrity, is exactly suited to a frugal and economical people;" and Mr Cleveland, doubtless, states a fact, and opens up a wide field for discussion. It may be claimed, too, with entire truth, that the best people on earth, the most trustworthy and reliable, and also the happiest, are the frugal and economical. Getting away from the home where he was taught to observe the principles of frugality and economy, and attempting to ape the ways of the large spenders of money in what has been called polite society, many a young man has become a defaulter or a forger and has gone down with his family into ruin. We leave to others more competent the task of discussing Mr Cleveland's great speech in all its bearings.

MEETING OF CITY ALDERMEN.

It was misty and somewhat disagreeable out of doors, several of the members were out of town and it was not very easy to muster a "quorum" at the Commissioners' meeting last night.

The following was the attendance—Mayor Forbis in the chair—Dodson, Jordan, Houston, Vanstory, Brown, H. L. Scott, Sergeant, Thomas, Clerk Nelson being absent Mr. Houston was called to officiate in his stead. The reading of the minutes was dispensed with. Mr. Ben C. Sharp presented the application of Mr. Young, of Reidsville, for a recommendation to sell liquors in the Doggett building. On motion of Mr. Jordan the petition was laid over till next meeting.

Applications for clerkship of the Board were filed.

Mr. Sergeant read rules and regulations prepared by the Supt. for the government of the white graded school, as to Supt. teachers and pupils. Various amendments were inserted and the document was approved. One important feature was the restoration, by ordinance, of corporal punishment, accompanied by two conditions: 1st That parents who did not wish their children subjected to the corporal punishment rule should so inform the authorities in writing, and that in case of insubordination on the part of such the penalty should be expulsion.

2nd. That all corporal punishment should be inflicted by the Supt. of the school, and not in public.

Supt. Grimsley informed the Board of the necessity for books of reference in the school—unabridged dictionaries, and a good encyclopedia—and said they were invaluable to teachers and pupils. On motion of Mr. Dodson the question of purchasing these books for reference was left with the committee to be reported on hereafter.

Mr. Houston reported as to certain piping that had been left over after completing sewer contract, and it was ordered that the city buy all available pipe of that class. A motion prevailed to put in a sewer pipe from the summit of Sycamore street to pass near the Benbow House and connect with the main line on South Elm street and referred to Sewerage Committee.

WATER ANALYSIS.

The Mayor read the water analysis of Prof. Ladewy, in which the Prof. stated that the water from the city water-works is not injurious to health. Filed with the clerk for record.

On the question of the city Fire Alarm apparatus, the Mayor was instructed to communicate with the Gaynor Co. at Louisville—that their system was out of order and they must send a hand at once to put it in order.

On motion adjourned to meet Monday night at 7 o'clock.

The Modern Tobacco Barn Company of Oxford was incorporated last week with a capital of \$250,000. B. A. Walters of Philadelphia was elected President; D. G. Devenish Secretary and Treasurer and Capt. W. H. Snow General Superintendent. E. D. Steele, D. A. Walters and W. H. Snow are the directors.

The building at Oxford is 50x200 feet and another house of the same dimensions will be erected.—High Point Enterprise.
