DRIVING ON FOOT.

The present generation is peculiarly nervous and impatient, and it is not unlikely that the great speed of travel to which men have now attained has contributed smartly toward producing this impatience. On this line of thought read the following news item:

"A drove of 166 turkeys reached here to-day, having been driven on foot by two men from Patrick county, a distance of one hundred miles. They were ten days making the trip."

The above represents the patient and persevering spirit of fifty years ago. It is a question at all times open for discussion whether the man who goes through the world at a slow and moderate pace, does not gather for himself more of the fruits found by the way than the one who goes through in a hurry. Of a piece with the driving of these turkeys one hundred miles is the old-time practice of driving hogs across the Blue Ridge into central and lower Virginia from away up in Tennessee and Kentucky. What a sight it was to behold when three or four men on foot, with their muddy boots and long whips, walked behind a drove of five hundred fat hogs, putting up for the night here and yonder and selling at so much per hundred.

The owner or owners of the hogs in such cases rode on horse-back and were enabled to go before both to sell and to arrange for entertainment. A Kentucky hog driver was often neither more nor less than a giant, especially when, at the close of his day's travel, having eaten nothing since breakfast, he sat down to make a "square meal" at a well kept country tavern. Where he slept and how, after eating that supper, mattered but little to him.

FINANCES AND TROUBLE.

In a news dispatch from Winston to a Richmond paper, in relation to the return of the two young females who ran away from Winston and were recently brought back at a cost of some three hundred dollars to their parents, the writer says the girls cost their parents "a great deal of trouble besides." No doubt of it. The patriarch Jacob is not the only one whose children have brought down their gray hairs with sorrow to the grave. These young Winston girls were very foolish. They would have been better off in a very sorry home than they were running away to a strange portion of the separate country.

FROM LOUISBURG.

A correspondent of the News-Observer, writing from Louisburg, writes as follows:

The Fife meeting which has been in operation for the past ten days in this town came to an end last night. It has been a gloriously successful meeting. The attendance has averaged nearly or quite two thousand and there have been not less than two hundred conversions.

Mr. Fife is an earnest, consecrated man, a diligent student of the Bible and preaches plainly and effectively. On Thanksgiving day a collection was taken at the afternoon service for the Orphanages and netted \$157.08 and on Sunday morning before the services began a collection amounting to more than one thousand dollars was taken up and the same presented to Mr. Fife.

Mr. W. H. Furman, Jr., a druggist of this place, died last night at 7 o'clock, and Miss Frances Arendell died at 6 o'clock this morning.

EMPLOYMENT FOR WOMEN.

The number of white women in this city who earn their own livelihood in different callings is estimated, on good authority, to be as high as six thousand; but whether these figures are exactly correct or not, the number of white women who support themselves in this city by their own labor is probably greater in proportion to the population than it is in any of the Southern cities. Indeed, the proportion will bear very favorable comparison with the number of women employed in the great cities of the North.

This fact speaks well for the liberality of sentiment which prevails among those who control the industrial interests of this community. The enlargement of the industrial sphere of women is one of the most truly beneficent movements of this enlightened age. We have many men amongst us whose example carries great weight, who have used all their influence in favor of extending every opportunity of self-support to women, and in doing so they have not only carried the gratitude of the class so honorably assisted, but have also conferred a very substantial benefit upon the whole community.—Richmond Times.
