David McCracken's Family, 1810-1925 David Vaughn, the eighth in line of Joseph McCracken, was born Dec. 12. 1810, died May 28, 1897.

He was married three time, first time to Mary Garret, no children by this union, second time to Annie Jones from which union were born five children, William Pinkney. Thomas B., Enos E., and Sarah. He was married the third time to Mary Haynes and there was born to this union one son, Caudler, and two daughters, Laura and Ellera Two these sons, William P. and Thomas B. were in the Confederate Army. William P. volunteered in the first company that was made up in Haywood founty but died before he saw service, April 20, 1861, leaving nis commission of a lieutenancy unfulfilled. He was killed near Petersburg. Virginia...

Thomas B. was born Oct. 17, 1842, died April 12, 1917. He was married to Sallie J. Kirkpatrick Dec. 25, 1866. He was in the Confederate Army four years and was a loyal and brave soldler. He was captured in the Valley of Virginia and made a prisoner at Camp Horton for nine months, during which time he said, "he al-
