**NEAR EAST RELIEF.**

The following is an urgent message received by the Near East Relief headquarters in Charlotte. Rev. S. R. Crockett urges all who can to contribute at their earliest convenience to make his report on his return by next week.

**Near East Relief.**

Inadequate funds have already resulted in lack of food and clothing in all the areas. This means short rations for children in orphanages and no food or clothing for those whom we have been helping on outside. Teaching staff and school equipment are woefully inadequate for training children in early independent work habits. Inadequate funds mean that children even with relatives cannot be sent to distant relatives until early spring. Therefore, must make reduction in turn until they can be sent back to their relatives. Thousands of children are now without food and clothing in refugee camps. They are becoming stunted mentally and physically and also morally. No American's seeing and understanding the situation would approve of the most orphanage or boarding school and continued failure to provide adequately for refugees from children. We earnestly beg adequate funds to end ill-considered retrenchment and urge sufficient provisions for orphanage children also one meal daily during the next six months for at least ten thousand of the twenty-five thousand refugees in camps.
