MRS. J. W. HOUSTON ADDRESSES COMMUNITY CLUB.

The Community Club met on Monday afternoon, March 16th at 4:30 in the club rooms.

The meeting opened with the singing of "America The Beautiful," followed by the prayer for club women, after which reports were called for from officers, departmental chairmen and standing committees.

Mrs. Gwyn, chairman of the Dramatic Department, gave a report on the Carolina Play Makers, which the Community Club is bringing to Waynesville on May 2nd. This is one of the biggest things the club has ever attempted, and Waynesville has never had the privilege of seeing or hearing as finished a production as the Carolina Play Makers stake. Mrs. Gwyn read the list of the following chairman and vice chairmen which she had appointed, each chairman selecting her own sub-committees: Hospitality, chairman, Mrs. R. L. Lee, vice chairman, Mrs. R. L. Prevost; Publicity, chairman, Mrs. T. L. Gwyn, vice chairman, Miss Alice Quinlan; Auditorium, chairman, Mrs. R. O. Covington, vice chairman, Mrs. H. B. After business was finished, Mrs. Long introduced the speaker of the afternoon, Mrs. J. W. Houston, of Asheville, District President of Federated Clubs.

In her introduction Mrs. Houston said she wanted to tell a little of the work being done in the State Federation. The aim of all club work is threefold, with its social, intellectual and service side. Mrs. Jerman, State President, began her office with the slogan, "A club at every crossroads in North Carolina."

In our district thirteen counties are represented with a total of thirty-two clubs and twelve thousand club women. District No. 1 has taken as their special work the stamping out of illiteracy in our population, which is 90% native born.

Mrs. Houston also touched on law observance as "The ropes of today are the bells of tomorrow." She especially stressed the home and home life as most vital to the country. She ended her remarks with saying the supreme aim of club women is service, and that "Service is the rent we pay for being permitted to live in the world."

At the conclusion of Mrs. Houston's talk, Mrs. Fred Martin, accompanied by Mrs. Matney, sang "Nocturne," by Pearl Curran, giving for an encore, "Mrs. Rose," by Wm. G. Hammond.

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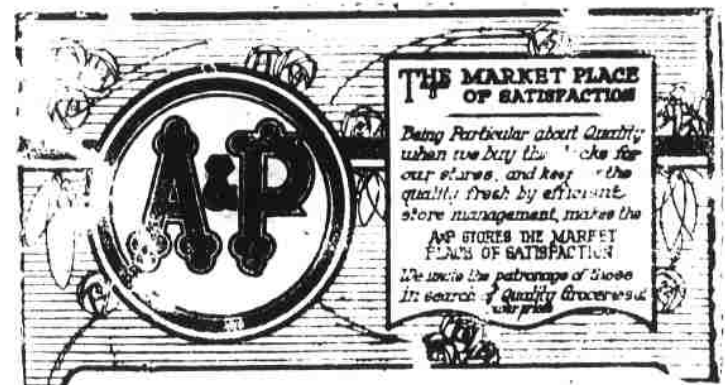
