ARE YOU FREE FROM BLAME?

In seven years, from 1915 to 1922 inclusive, defective chimneys and flues caused a loss of \$104,289,206 in the United States. As an originator of fires, only matches and smoking have a greater record than chimneys and flues.

"Safeguarding America Against Fire" shows by photographs the type of chimney in the average dwelling place which has caused this terrible loss. There is apparently no excuse for their existence other than the carelessness of the people who live in the houses where they are located.

These chimneys are shown to have specks between the bricks where the flame and smoke can come into contact with wooden walls. It makes one shudder to think of the thousands of helpless children, old persons, and cripples who are in homes where this lurking fire menace is ever-present.

Reflect for a moment that the greatest known fire starters are matches, smoking and defective chimneys, and that control over them rests almost entirely with the individual. The remedy lies in these areas of care almost wholly controllable by the individual.

NOTICE OF SPECIAL ELECTION FOR A TAX FOR A BOND ISSUE FOR A PUBLIC HOSPITAL AND FOR THE MAINTENANCE OF THE SAME IN HAYWOOD COUNTY.

Notice is hereby given that more than six hundred and seventeen (617) residents and freeholders of Haywood County, more than one hundred and fifty (150) of whom resides outside of the corporate limits of the Town of Waynesville, have duly filed before the Board of Commissioners for the County of Haywood a petition therein petitioning the Board of Commissioners for the County of Haywood to levy an annual tax not to exceed one-fiftieth of one per cent on the dollar to be levied for a period of time not exceeding thirty years, for the purpose of providing funds for the purchase of a site and the erection thereon of a public hospital and a hospital building in the eastern section of the town of Waynesville, in Haywood County, North Carolina.

And further notice is hereby given that on this date the Board of Commissioners for the County of Haywood have ordered a special election to be called and held in the several voting precincts of Haywood County on the 11th day of July, 1925, for the purpose of voting one-fiftieth of one per cent on the dollar tax for a bond issue for a public hospital and for the maintenance thereof, in the eastern section of the Town of Waynesville, such bond issue not to exceed \$100,000, and said tax to be levied for a period of time not to exceed thirty years.
