Grace Episcopal Church To Celebrate Tenth Anniversary Of The Rector

The Right Reverend Bishop of the Diocese will conduct a special service at "Grace Church in the Mountains" at eleven o'clock on Sunday, May 17th, to commemorate ten years ministry in Waynesville of Rev. Albert New, Rector of the Parish.

Mr. New came here from Grace Church, Weldon, Halifax County, where he was Rector for over three years.

During his ministry of ten years in Waynesville, the Rector has baptized fifty-nine children, officiated at nineteen weddings; conducted twenty funerals, and presented forty-six to the Bishop for Confirmation. There has, however, been phenomenal growth in the size of the local congregation, and members of the forty-six additional confirmations, thirty-one have removed from Waynesville and five are deceased.

The development of the activities of the Church has been maintained quietly and unobtrusively, but, nevertheless, most successfully. The Rector's first constructive task ten years ago was the elimination of an old debt of one thousand dollars. Then came the new Pipe Organ—the first in Waynesville—and the introduction of a vested choir. This was followed in quick succession by the further embellishment of the church with new electric fixtures and chandeliers; alms boxes and collection plates; a handsome processional cross; six memorial windows; new carpet; Altar hangings and dossal; hard wood floor, and pipeless furnace.

The street entrance to the Church grounds was greatly improved by a rock wall, sidewalk, and well kept paths; and the opening up of the lot on the north side of the church enlarged the fine stretch of church property to great advantage.

Mr. New then appealed for a Parish House, the former one having been totally destroyed by fire before he became Rector. After much patient work and constant appeals, six thousand dollars was raised and the present commodious building was built, for which a new piano was then purchased.

The Rector's policy throughout has been to "pay as you go" and contract no debts for future Rectors to meet. Over thirteen thousand dollars have been contributed to the Rector for these various improvements during the ten years.

Beyond and outside the activities of his church, Mr. New has entered most energetically into all movements of local civic advancement. Being himself a graduate with honors, of an English University, education in all branches has had his warmest support. He preached the Baccalaureate Sermon for the graduates in Waynesville High School in nineteen hundred and eighteen and again in nineteen hundred and twenty-four, and once more on the twenty-fourth day of this month will preach a third sermon to the nineteen hundred and twenty-five class.

Mr. New has spoken at every patriotic gathering, and during the World War, frequently ministered to the sick soldiers at the Government Hospital.

The Masons and Knight Templars have held many public services in his church, and the Masonic Order has honored Mr. New with the highest offices in their gift. He served one year as Worshipful Master of the local lodge; then as High Priest of the Royal Arch Chapter, and later as Prelate of the Knight Templars. In the Grand Lodge of the whole State, he first served as District Deputy for the forty-first District (Madison and Haywood Counties); and then received the high distinction of Grand Chaplain of North Carolina. Mr. New was made a thirty-second degree Mason of the Scottish Rite last November, and was then elected "Orator" of the Class.

In the public life of the city, the Rector is a charter member of the Goodfellows.

NOTICE OF SPECIAL ELECTION FOR A TAX FOR A BOND ISSUE FOR THE MAINTENANCE OF THE SAME IN HAYWOOD COUNTY.

Notice is hereby given that more than six hundred and seventeen (617) residents and freeholders of Haywood County, more than one hundred and fifty (150) of whom resides outside of the corporate limits of the Town of Waynesville, have duly filed before the Board of Commissioners for the County of Haywood a petition petitioning the Board of Commissioners for the County of Haywood to levy an annual tax not to exceed one-fiftieth of one per cent on the dollar to be levied for a period of time not exceeding thirty years, for the purpose of providing funds for the purchase of a site and the erection thereon of a public hospital and a hospital building in the eastern section of the town of Waynesville, in Haywood County, North Carolina.

And further notice is hereby given that on this date the Board of Commissioners for the County of Haywood have ordered a special election to be called and held in the several voting precincts of Haywood County on the 11th day of July, 1925, for the purpose of voting one-fiftieth of one cent on the dollar tax for a bond issue for a public hospital and for the maintenance thereof, in the eastern section of the Town of Waynesville, a bond issue not to exceed \$100,000, and said tax to be levied for a period of time not to exceed thirty years.

And notice is further hereby given that a new registration of the votes of Haywood County has been ordered by the Board of Commissioners for the County of Haywood for the purpose of said special election, as provided by law, and to that end and for the purposes aforesaid the registration books for the several voting precincts of Haywood County will be open from and after the 13th day of June, 1925, as provided by law.

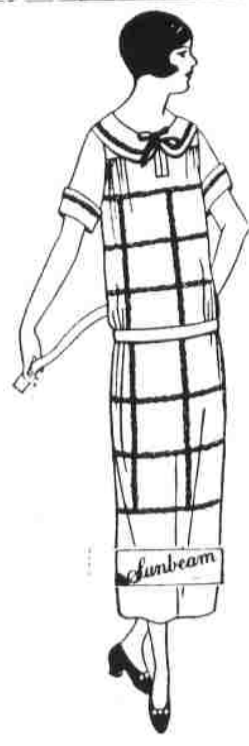

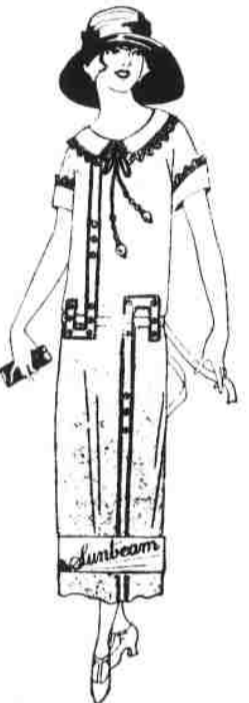

Telephone Growth Continues

THE growth and progress of North Carolina last year was strikingly reflected in the large investment in additions and extensions to the telephone system.

Such an active year of construction has rarely been experienced in the State, and, as a result, the telephone service is more extensive and more valuable than ever before.

In North Carolina last year the telephone workers handled 21,149 telephone stations, making a net gain of 6,227 new telephones and involving gross additions to plant of approximately \$1,634,471.

To accomplish this big task required the services of 1,257 workers, whose annual wage bill was \$1,449,620.

The investment in service in North Carolina as of December 31, 1924, was \$8,127,364, and there are now 55,250 Bell telephones in the State.

Some of the items included in the investment are 32 central offices, 141,305 miles of wire, 1,872 miles of pole line and 140 miles of underground duct.
