in that line increased until he was moved to apply for a license as a pharmacist. The business continued to grow through various vicissitudes, culminating in a fire about seven years ago which destroyed his stock and partially ruined the building. From the ashes of the old arose the present town, enlarged and commodious structure.

A year ago last February, Dr. Medford admitted his son, D. B. Medford, not yet 21 years of age, into partnership with him in the business of the store. The enterprising young man had previously on the outside shown his mettle and proven himself worthy of such a partnership.

In addition to the professional activities and responsibilities above recited, Dr. Medford has served as judge of Clyde several terms, also as secretary and treasurer and one term as mayor. For many years he has been choir leader of the local Baptist church. At present he is treasurer of the church and responsible for the safe keeping and proper distribution of the \$12,000 building fund raised for the construction of the church edifice now in course of erection.

If there exists any other Tar Heel town, the size of Clyde, which claims as a citizen a man who can show a

record for a greater diversity of usefulness and successful activities together with a record for assuming greater and more varied responsibilities, the fact should be given wide publicity. The information would act as a stimulus and inspiration for many a young man entering upon his life work. Such records of unremitting and devoted service to the community in which a man was born and reared are all too few and far between and growing fewer every succeeding year.

CORP. SULLIVAN CITED FOR BRAVERY.

(Native Waynesville Boy a hero.)
Citation: Corporal Francis D. Sullivan, 6346426, Medical Department, Carlisle Barracks, Pa., now on detached service with the Philadelphia Recruiting District with station at the Allentown Substation.

For exceptionally meritorious distinguished service and extraordinary heroism, while on duty as a quartermaster at the Allentown Army Recruiting Substation on Wednesday, June 17, 1925.

Corporal Sullivan, while visiting neighboring town, with the Army Recruiting Truck, came to the home of J. E. Scheetz, Superintendent of the Egypt Silk Mill and noticed an unusual gathering of about 150 men with indications of considerable commotion and excitement. It developed that Elvin Dreher, 35 years, and his father had just cleaned a sink on the Scheetz home and Dreher, lowered into the pit with a rope for a final inspection, became overcome with gas. An unsuccessful attempt to rescue him had been made. Corporal Sullivan immediately volunteered for the rescue. At the risk of his life, he was lowered into the pit and brought the victim out. The victim Dreher, was dead and the Corporal exhausted and overcome with gas, requiring medical treatment.

Corporal Sullivan enlisted May 16, 1924, at Fort Bragg, N. C., for the Medical Department. He is a graduate of the Non-Commissioned Officers' School, Carlisle Barracks, Pa. He was attached to the Philadelphia Army Recruiting District, May 15, 1925, with station at Allentown, Pa., since May 29, 1925.

Corporal Sullivan is recommended for Distinguished Service Medal.

TRUETT-McCONNELL TABERNACLE UNDER CONSTRUCTION

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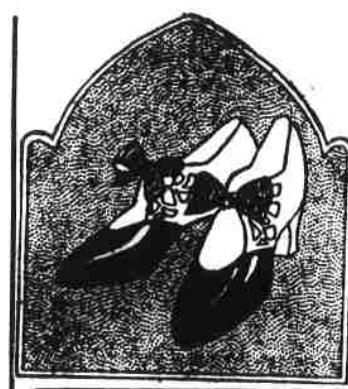
