

A New and Faster Service to Asheville and Canton

BEGINNING July 13th a new and faster Long Distance Telephone service will be inaugurated from Waynesville to Asheville and Canton.

Calls to Asheville and Canton can be made by simply giving your regular operator the telephone number of the distant party.

For example, when your operator asks "Number, please," give her the number wanted, as, "Asheville 123." While you hold your receiver to your ear, she will ring the Asheville number. Calls to Canton can be made in the same way.

The service is faster and the cost to you is less—25c for a five-minute talk to Asheville and 10c for a five-minute talk to Canton.

This new, fast service applies to calls for numbers only. Calls for a particular person and collect calls should be given to "Long Distance" in the usual way.

Beginning next Monday, try this service on your toll calls to Asheville and Canton.
