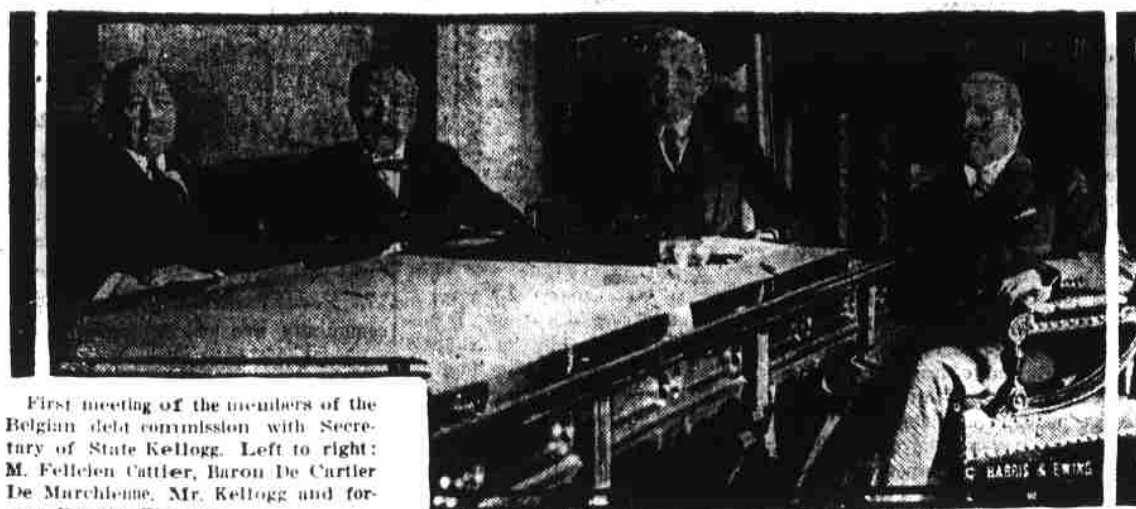


**Mr. Kellogg and Belgium's Debt Commissioners**



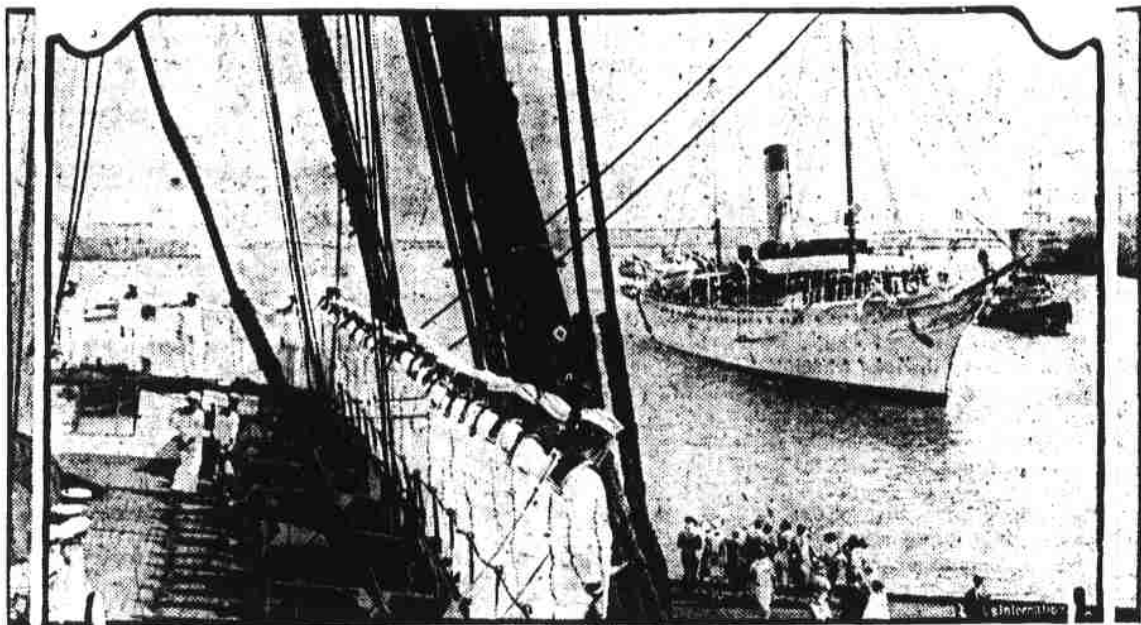

**Cape Cod Town Had to Dispose of These Blackfish**



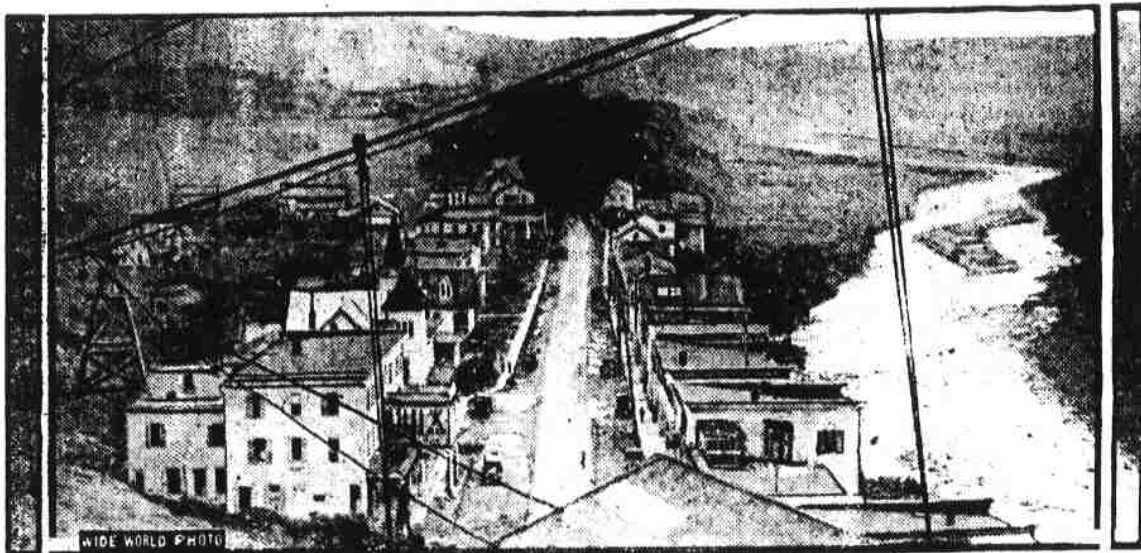

**Artificial Lake Will Engulf This Village**



The little village of Gilboa, N. Y., once a prosperous farming center, soon will be the bottom of an artificial lake 150 feet deep, five miles long, and holding 22,000,000,000 gallons of water for the supply of New York City. The town dates from 1700. The waters of Schoharie creek, blocked by an enormous dam, will be carried from this artificial lake through eighteen miles of tunnel to feed the Ashokan reservoir. **FUNERAL SERVICES FOR MRS. FERGUSON HELD YESTERDAY.**

Beautiful Floral Tributes Sent by Individuals and Societies of Which She Was a Former Member.

Funeral services for Mrs. Maud MacLean Ferguson, wife of W. E. Ferguson, who died after a brief illness on Friday afternoon from the residence at 3401 West avenue with the Rev. L. T. Williams, pastor of Trinity M. E. Church, officiating. Burial was made in Greenlawn cemetery.

There was a profusion of flowers at the home, with many beautiful tributes from organizations to which Mrs. Ferguson had belonged, as well as from friends of her husband. Among these were flowers from the

A. board of directors, the Apprentice school, the Newport News Shipbuilding and Dry Dock Company, of which Mr. Ferguson is production manager, the Fannie Asher Circle, the Woman's Missionary Society of Trinity M. E. Church, Order of the Eastern Star, Douglas MacLean Production Company, the Woman's Club and the class of 1900 of the U. S. Naval Academy, with which Mr. Ferguson was graduated at Annapolis.

The members of the Missionary Society and the Fannie Asher Circle attended in a body, while there were so many others on hand to pay a last tribute to Mrs. Ferguson that a large crowd was forced to stand on the lawn while the services were in progress.

Many of the flowers were later taken to Greenlawn where they com-

pletely covered the plot after the body had been lowered to its last resting place.

At the conclusion of the funeral services by the minister, a quartette from the Woman's Club sang two hymns, the first being "Asleep in Jesus" and the second, "Shall We Meet Beyond the River" as the body was being borne out from the house for the last time.
