Who, for instance, will ever forget the exquisite little tribute in last Monday's paper to the violet? It is pasted in a thousand scrap-books today.

"We speak of him as individual and newspaper man: He was faithful to his trust, loyal to his paper and to his friends. Able, brilliant, brave, tender, generous, sympathetic, unselfish. These propositions none will be found to dispute."
