Justice of Rutherford will preach the introductory sermon, and reports will be received and acted upon concerning the various phases of Baptist church work in the territory of this association. These annual meetings are important and a large attendance is assured.

Rev. G. F. Wolfe.

Rev. G. F. Wolfe preached in the Baptist church Sunday night. His text was, I am the Shepard of the sheep. I know my sheep and am known of mine. He said the people were divided into two classes—sheep and goats. He told how sheep are affected with three diseases. First foot evil, which caused them to stumble and fall and being unable to walk fell out of the flock. He said church members got the foot evil around Christmas time and went to dances, etc. Second the mouth disease, which affected the sheep and prevented their grazing. At elections, he said, the church members got the mouth disease and passed around the bottle and the jug. Third the big head, in which the sheeps' sense were affected and they could be neither led nor driven. He declared church members should be humble but when affected by the big head, formality, fashion and pride caused the church to lose control of them and they perished in a spiritual sense. The simile was well sustained and was listened to with much interest by his hearers.
