In order to get such a school it will be necessary to have each township contribute its share to the maintenance of the school, make the tuition and expenses as low as possible and let each 'township offer scholarships covering all expenses per term to be awarded by competitive examination. In this way a friendly rivalry is engendered and interest aroused and the scholarships would be eagerly sought by ambitious boys and girls to the last-


TOOK FATAL DOSE.




