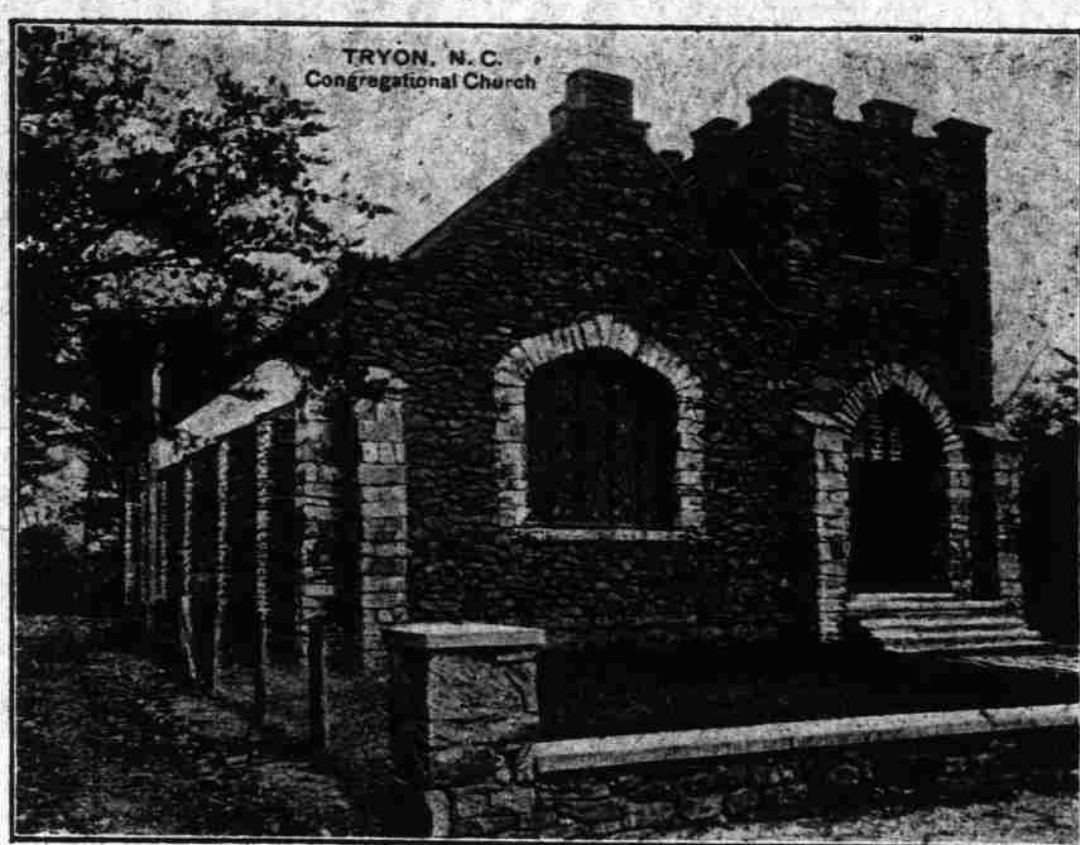

**LYNN.**

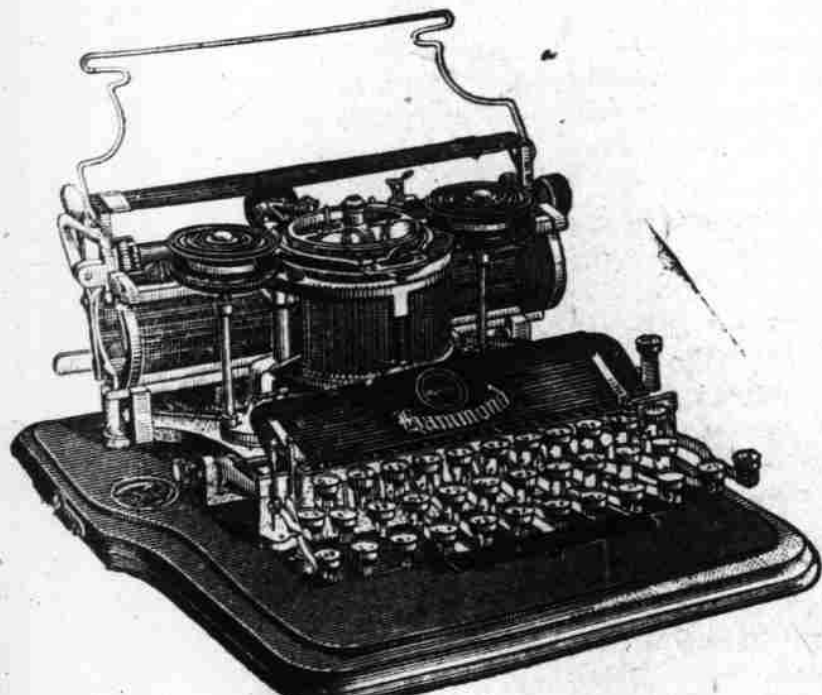
Rev. H. Norwood Bowse will conduct services in Lynn Sunday afternoon at 3:30 o'clock.
