## Corn and Garden Awards Made At Charity High School Event

A Wallace Postal employee and a public school administrator won the top honors at the annual corn and garden awards night program Oct. 25 at the Charity High School cafeteria.

Fitzhugh Newton of Wallace won the garden cup after attaining the highest score in garden production and conservation, while Windsor Johnson took home the corn cup with a production of 145 bushels per acre. This announcement was made by R. E. Wilkins County Negro Agent.

This was the 5th year of the contest and some 200 gardeners and corn producers were in attendance.

L. R. Johnson, District Agent for North Carolina Extension Service made the principal address. Johnson praised the group for the

effort in the past and challenged them to rise up in the trying years ahead in the area of agriculture. The agricultural leader reminded his audience of the high honor of being named "County of the Year" in North Carolina, and urged them to a repeat performance.

James Moore Jr., of Rt. 1, Warsaw took the highest honor in the Junior Division in corn production. Young Moore's acre yielded 134.4 bushels of corn. The Smith Douglas Fertilizer firm at Warsaw presented him with a special award. The Rose Hill Trading Co. of Rose Hill sent a letter to champion Johnson donating a half bushel of Hybrid seed for his 1963 crop. Forty-seven garden certificates and 72 corn certificates were awarded. Earlier in the program J. H. Harris, Negro County Assistant Agent gave a report on the garden contest. Mrs. Edna Wallace, of Wallace gave a report on the garden contest.

Sandra Annette Carlton, 4-H County Council president made an appeal to parents of 4-H club members to encourage and assist their youngsters in 4-H club work. The 4-H officer explained that interest was high at the present, but could not remain so unless parents lend the youngsters the support they need to succeed in their 4-H work.

Weed Control demonstration report was given by Willie Spearman. Judging for the occasion was Mrs. Etta Solomon and W. L. Pierce of the Charity High School, Home Economics and Vo-Ag Departments.
