The Supreme Court of North Carolina in June of this year. A jury in the superior court had allowed Smith to recover a judgment of \$7,000. But the Supreme Court held that the trial judge erred in not granting the State Highway Commission a nonsuit at the close of the plaintiff's evidence. The plaintiff had no cause of action, and the trial judge should not have let the case go to the jury. The Supreme Court pointed out that a change of grade of a highway or street causes damage to the property of an abutting property owner. There is no question a "taking" in the constitutional sense so as to require compensation therefor as in eminent domain. This rule does not, however, apply to cases of partial takings, where damage to the remainder by reason of change of grade is involved.
