Murphy Rivenbark 111 Affiliates With Wayne Dairies, Goldsboro

Murphy Rivenbark 111, Wallace, who for the past two years has been distributor for Sealtest Dairies in this area, is now distributor and representative for Wayne Dairies Inc., Goldsboro. The announcement of Rivenbark's affiliation with Wayne Dairies was made last week and became effective Dec. 3.

Wayne Dairies Inc., which is now

distributing products in Duplin from Rivenbark's plant in Teachey, is a cooperative concern owned by producers who sell their products to the firm.

"I feel that I can better benefit the people of Duplin County by distributing dairy products produced right here at home," stated Rivenbark in listing the major reason for his switch to Wayne Dairies. Mr. Rivenbark also disclosed that Wayne Dairy is now buying from 80 to 90 per cent of all the milk produced commercially in Duplin County.

Three refrigerated trucks are presently in use by Rivenbark and two more are expected to be added in the near future.
