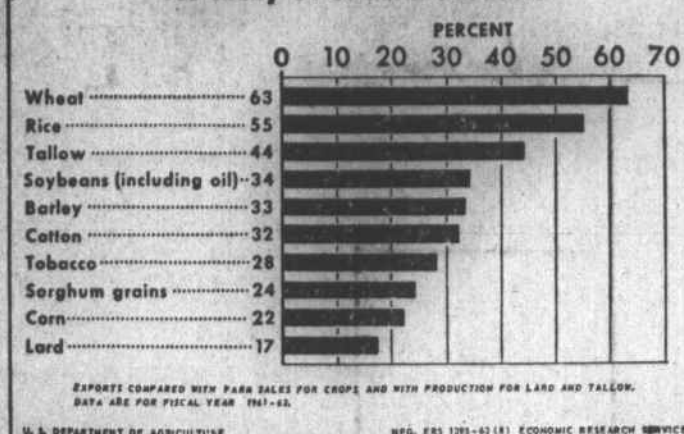
Mr. and Mrs. Chuck Goodrich of Goldsboro visited Mr. and Mrs. nine attended camp.
