

Deceased Veterans Used 164,000 Flags

More than 164,000 American flags used to drape the caskets of deceased veterans were issued in 1963, the Veterans Administration said today.

That was about 11,000 more than in the previous year when 153,183 were given out, according to J. D. DeRamus, Manager of the North Carolina VA Regional Office.

These flags are used to drape the caskets of veterans with wartime service who were discharged under conditions other than dishonorable, or who served at least one enlistment during peacetime, unless discharged or released from duty for disability in line of

service.

Customarily these flags are given to next of kin, close friends or associates of the veterans at the conclusion of the services.

DeRamus said flags may be obtained from VA offices and at some 15,400 post offices in this country as well as embassies, consulates, Department.

During the past 13 years the number of flags issued has increased from 81,000 annually to the more than 164,000 figure.

GERMAN PEACH PUDDING

1/2 cup butter or margarine
2/3 cup sugar
1 egg
1 cup flour
1 teaspoon baking powder
1/2 cup milk
4 cups chopped peaches
1 cup sugar

Cream together butter and 2/3 cup sugar. Beat in the egg thoroughly. Sift together the flour and baking powder, then add it alternately with the milk to the egg and butter mixture. Beat until smooth. Pour into a 1-1/2 quart casserole or 8-inch baking pan. Pour over the batter 4 cups of chopped peaches that have been sweetened with 1 cup sugar. Bake in a moderate oven at 350 degrees for 40 minutes or until done. Serve with or without heavy cream
