The Duplin County Democratic Executive Committee met on Thursday afternoon, March 24 and elected W. Orlando (Joe) Albertson as a member of the County Board of Education. Albertson will fill the vacancy created by James Albertson who died two weeks ago.

The state statute provides that if a member of the county board of Education should die in office, resign or otherwise, his vacancy should be filled by the action of the County Executive Committee of the political party of the member causing such vacancy until the regular session of the General Assembly, and then for the residue of the unexpired term of that body.

Joe Albertson of Beaulville, is brother of the late James Albertson. He lives in the town of Beaulville and works at DuPont in Kinston. He is married to the former, Joyce Jackson of Beaulville, and they have two daughters in school, Cathy and Gail. He is a member of the Presbyterian Church.

Bank Of Mt. Olive Approved For Warsaw

Warsaw will have another bank. The Warsaw Branch of Bank of Mount Olive was approved on Wednesday, March

23, by the State Banking Commission.

The Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation will consider it and when it passes their approval, work will begin on the renovation of a building. The Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation should render their decision within 60 days. Mr. E. C. Casey, president of the bank made this announcement on Thursday.

The Bank of Mount Olive has leased half of the Warsaw Bus Station building in Warsaw. The office will be completely renovated to house the office of

a full service branch. Drive ways and parking areas will be paved.

The Bank of Mount Olive was organized in 1901 and now operates branches in Calypso, Seven Springs in addition to a drive-in branch in Mount Olive.

The Bank of Mount Olive has

applied and expects to open a branch in Deep Run within two weeks and have the approval and expect to open a branch in Grantham within 30 days. Application has been filed to construct a building in Seven Springs. The building will be Colonial architectural design. On December 31, 1965 total resources of Bank of Mount

Olive were \$9,224,411.40.

Mr. Casey expressed thanks to the Warsaw people and was most complimentary of the cooperation and welcome which the bank had received in making plans. He stated that a group of Warsaw area citizens chartered a bus to go to the hearing in Raleigh last Wednesday.
