ECC Students Practice Teach In Duplin County

With Our Boys

GREENVILLE -- Almost 300 East Carolina College education majors are student-teaching in the schools of 23 North Carolina counties this term.

The office of Dr. Thomas A. Chambliss, director of student-teaching, has announced the names of 295 students and the 90 schools to which they are assigned.

Counting the current quarter's 295, East Carolina has sent nearly 700 student-teachers to various schools in the state during this school year. Last fall there were 193 and in the winter term there were 228.

The student-teacher program is part of the regular course of instruction for ECC students who

are preparing to teach. As teaching interns the students gain practical experience under supervision.

They conduct regular lessons and classroom activities under the direction and observation of professional supervisors. At the end of the term they receive regular college grades based on their performances.
