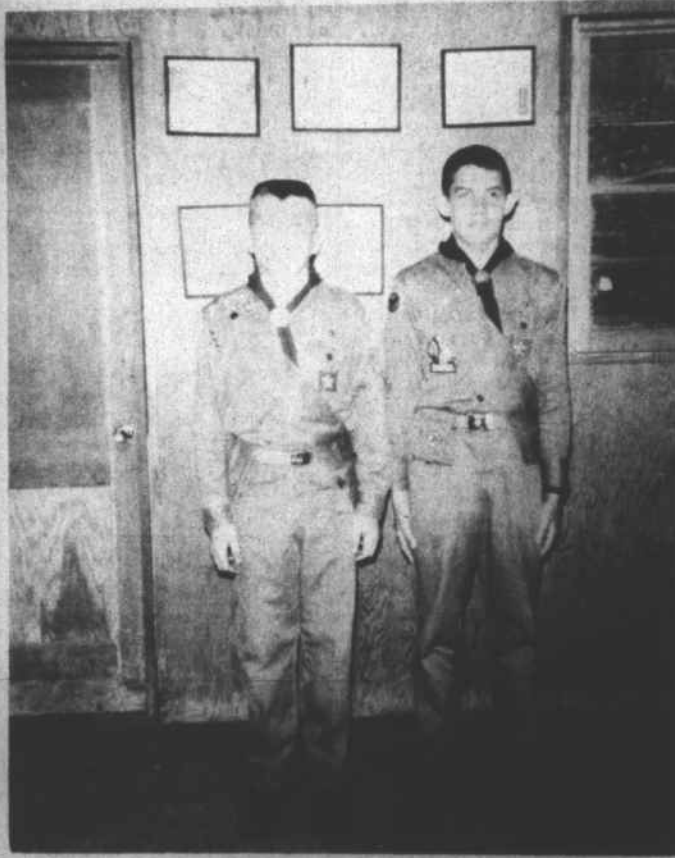

Mr. T. J. Turner is a Pink Hill businessman, an elder of the Pink Hill Presbyterian Church, and a former representative of Wilmington Presbytery to the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church, U. S. He was elected moderator at a regular meeting of the Presbytery at its Camp and Conference Center, Kirkwood, near Wallace, N. C.

Wilmington Presbytery met Thursday, May 19, 1966 at the Delgade Presbyterian Church, Wilmington, for its 227th meeting with T. J. Turner presiding as moderator. Along with other routine business, two young men were examined by the moderator as candidates for the ministry and to be received under the watch care of the Presbytery. They were Mr. David Earl Allen of Wilmington and Mr. Charles Herring of Pink Hill.

Mr. Herring, a member of the Pink Hill Presbyterian Church, is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Charlie Herring, Route 2, Pink Hill, and is presently a freshman at Mount Olive College. He plans to attend Wilmington College for his junior and senior years of college work.

Also examined as candidates for Ordination were four men who have just completed their studies at Union Theological Seminary at Richmond, Va. These men were received into Wilmington Presbytery and are scheduled to be ordained in the immediate future as Presbyterian Ministers. They were Mr. James R. Dellart to serve the Shallotte Presbyterian Church, Shallotte; Mr. Charles R. Moore to serve the Lake Waccamaw Presbyterian Church, Lake Waccamaw; Mr. Ted J. Plott to serve the Garland Presbyterian Church, Garland and Mr. W. Marshall Tredway to serve the Pink Hill and Pleasant View Presbyterian Churches.

Mr. Tredway is a native of Danville, Virginia. He entered the ministry after several years experience in the automobile business as sales manager and general manager for an Oldsmobile-Cadillac dealership. Mr. and Mrs. Tredway and son, Billie, moved last Saturday into the Pink Hill Presbyterian Manse and his ordination service will be held in the Pink Hill Presbyterian Church on June 6th.

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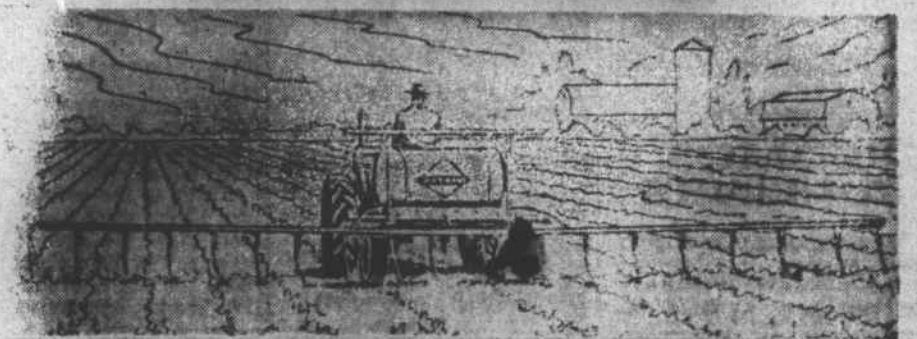
