What does the population explosion mean to us and our food supply? To our children? Our grandchildren an others to follow? Are we planning well on the local, regional, national and international levels to meet adequately the needs of future generations? Or, are we becoming too complacent in this age of

affluence and power? I have written, many times, concerning the importance of long-range planning to meet the needs of our expanding population by conservation of our natural resources, rural and urban planning and development and the essentiality of protecting our food supply.

I have recently read a very penetrating article written by Mr. Anthony E. Cascino, vice president of Agricultural Products Marketing Group, International Minerals and Chemical Corporation. I am passing along to you some of his facts and figures because I feel they will be of interest.

"We are talking about peo-ple, masses of people, and about food," The world population to-day is in excess of three billion

people and is increasing.
Since the beginning of time,
the first billion population mark
was not reached until 1850. But it took only 80 years (1930) for the world population to reach the two billion mark. The three billion mark was reached in 1960, and now we are in the midst of building up to the fourth billion, expected to be reached by 1975.
