tion ready for finishing and use in the furniture industry. Bill Hennessy, Bill Lee, L. D. Grooms and George Cases welcomed the group to Cases Pickles Inc. in Faison and explained this operation.

One of the largest manufacturers of pickles, Cases Pickles are recognized nationally, and their story is a story of growth and progress. In season, a normal days intake of cucumbers is 25 to 30 thousand bushels. Some 700 vats are used to process these in preparation for packing. Onion, cauliflower, and watermelon rind pickles are also packed.

The storage warehouse was most interesting with merchandise packed and bearing the label of many consumers. The storage space has been increased five times in the past nine years and now contains 65,000 square feet.

The afternoon tour began with the Warsaw Manufacturing Company where Mr. Robert Matthews showed the group the cutting operation and the various operations required to complete the garments.

Mr. Francis Oakley of National Spinning conducted a tour of their operation and explained the various steps in processing the yarn at their plant. National Spinning is one of the newer industries in Duplin County channeling into its economy each week a payroll in excess of \$25,000.

National Spinning started operation here in March of 1965 with approximately sixty employees. The plant now employs about three hundred twenty-five persons and construction will begin in January 1968 on an expansion to be ready for use by spring of 68.

Mr. Ralph Cottle, personnel director explained Reeves Brothers, Inc. operations and exhibited the many items they manufacture which include decorative pillows, bed rests, and throw-type furniture coverings.

Mr. Charles Ledbetter is manager of the plant which has a modern new air conditioned 100,000 square foot building. The majority of the 300 employees come from Duplin County and their weekly payroll is a substantial boost to the area's economy.

Mr. L. C. Woodcock, manager of Southeastern Farmers Grain Elevator, located one mile south of Warsaw on highway 117, the farmer owned cooperative has 1050 members. The 511,000 bushel elevator was built with a FHA loan of \$700,000.

The machinery is of the most modern design, which can unload all types trucks with safety, speed and efficiency.

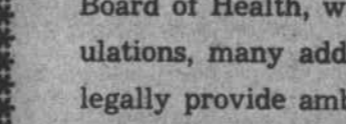

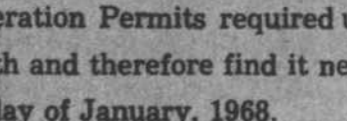

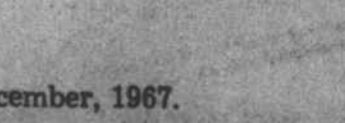
