A referendum will be held for all Duplin County cotton producers to determine whether transfer of allotment by sale or lease out-of-county shall be authorized for 1970. The referendum will be conducted by mail during the period May 5 through May 9, 1969. Ballots will be mailed to all known eligible voters on May 2, 1969. If you are a cotton producer and do not receive a ballot, you may obtain one from the county office. If you are unsure of your eligibility to vote in the referendum, information is available in the county office.

OATS AND RYE ON 1969 DIVERTED AND CONSERVING ACREAGE

Requests are currently being accepted from producers to leave oats and/or rye standing on diverted acreage for the purpose of natural reseeding. An administrative fee of \$5.00 per farm must also be paid for an inspection after the disposition date. If permission has not been granted to leave oats and/or rye on the land, they must be destroyed no later than May 31, 1969.

DATES TO REMEMBER

1. May 9—Return cotton transfer ballots by this date.
2. May 31—File requests to leave oats and/or rye on diverted and conserving acreage.
