WETS vs. DRYS

"Wet" and "Dry" have nothing to do with the November 6 referendum. It really is a question as to how liquor will be sold and controlled. The choice is yours. You must decide. Do you want to keep our present system or add the Liquor-by-the-drink plan to it? It's as simple as that and has nothing to do with whether or not you drink.

LET'S LOOK AT BOTH SIDES:

- THEY say:**
1. Liquor-by-the-drink will bring in more conventions.
 2. It will bring more entertainment to North Carolina.
 3. It will increase tourism.
 4. It will provide the privilege of having a drink mixed for you.
 5. The higher price per drink will result in a better control of liquor by economically encouraging moderation.
 6. Liquor-by-the-drink will result in more revenues to the state.
 7. There will be no increase in alcohol-related problems.
 8. They don't say what else will follow if this plan is passed.

- WE say:**
1. They are probably right.
 2. They are probably right, but WHAT KIND?
 3. Perhaps, but tourism is North Carolina's 3rd largest industry now, (approximately \$900 million per year) and we can't imagine liquor-by-the-drink encouraging more families to vacation at our beaches, mountains, or theme parks like Carowinds.
 4. It certainly will do that.
 5. Absolutely not. Studies show that the price of liquor has little effect on its consumption. We believe that the state ABC stores offer a better means of control than a bartender or a cocktail waitress.
 6. We disagree. Records show that states collect less taxes on beverage alcohol when it is sold by the drink than when it is sold by the bottle.
 7. We strongly disagree. Statistics from similar American communities show that when liquor is allowed to be sold by the drink, the legislation is almost automatically followed by increased traffic injuries and fatalities. More broken homes, greater alcohol-generated absenteeism from work, and chronic alcoholism, as well as greater and more expensive social problems that your tax dollars must pay for.
 8. WE say that's what WE are worried about!
