Local Public Health News

Duplin County Health Department

The Duplin County Board of Health in a recent meeting reviewed the health department study, clearly identifying the future role of the department as one of protecting and promoting the health and healthy lifestyles of the citizens of the county. The challenge is to provide the opportunity for building the capabilities of each client and the community toward preventing disease and to improve health status. In the effort to achieve its purpose, the board charged the department with full responsibilities related to public health.

The board recognized as a result of the study, conducted by a professional health planner, and approved by the board of health and board of commissioners, that the future role of the health department was one of protecting and promoting health lifestyles of the people in Duplin County.

As a result of the challenge, the department is in the process of developing plans to cope with health needs as defined by the board.

The department has developed a program plan called adult health screening that will replace the primary care program in the future. Adult health screening will promote positive health and prevention of disease through risk identification, screening, education, monitoring, referral, follow-up and will place emphasis on reaching adults who are a greater risk. However, the program will be available to anyone 18 or over by appointment on the first and second Thursdays of each month.

Other services provided have been clearly identified as public health responsibilities including immunizations, home health, communicable disease, family planning, venereal disease and environmental health. These services have been or are in the process of being streamlined to be more effective.

The availability of physician coverage, holding clinics in the department, has been greatly increased by additional physician providers located in the county.

Future program objectives include a prenatal clinic and possibly a cancer detection clinic, both staffed by a physician, additional outreach health education and additional environmental staff to work more closely with hazardous waste and soil conditions.

The health department under the leadership of the health educator has reached an effective level to deal with the board of health and their request that top priority be given to increase health education and public awareness in all aspects of public health.

The department has an educational center, through the help of area health education center that provides materials, tapes, slides and films that will be made available to anyone in the county dealing with many types of preventable illnesses.

Energy Efficient Window Treatment

It is not too soon to start thinking about getting your home in shape for cold weather. Large picture windows are places where you may lose a lot of heat during cold days and nights.

Draperies can help heat loss. But there are some things you can do to make your window treatments more energy efficient.

Usually draperies extend about three inches out from the wall, and even when you close the draperies, if the top of the drapes aren't sealed in, warm air is drawn over the top of the drapes and cools on the window glass. Then this cold air flows back

into your room under the bottom of the drapes.

So, you can save heat and heating dollars by closing in the top of the draperies. Consider making a closed-top decorative cornice. Or, if you already have a valance, close the top of it with wood, plastic or non-flammable rigid insulation. This is only one way to make your home more energy efficient, but it is one that you might be able to do yourself at little cost -- and it will help you save money on your utility bill, too.
