There seems to be two sides to winning, and Coach Jack Holley at Wallace-Rose Hill High School faces both Friday night at Legion Stadium. Wallace-Rose Hill will host the final round of Division II play-offs Nov. 26. Wallace-Rose Hill faces

Holley's former team, Tabor City, or Clarkton, a team coached by Holley's 1964 high school quarterback Raymond Marlow, in the final play-off game. "There is going to be a lot of emotion in either game we play," Holley smiled. "Three of the Tabor City football coaches are men I worked with for years - in fact, one of them 14 years."

Holley, a 20-year veteran of high school football, came to Duplin County from Tabor City High School. Holley coached 18 years in Columbus County at Tabor City and Hallsboro, and both high schools boast winning football teams under his

leadership.
James Kenan High School suffered losses to Holley's winning teams at both Hallsboro and Tabor City during

past play-off action. Wallace-Rose Hill boasts a 10-1 season record under Holley, after years of consecutive losses. Last season was the first in five years that Tabor City failed to see play-off action, but were in a three-way tie for the conference championship.

"The players seem to be willing to work," Holley said. "They (W-RH football players) have done what I asked of them." The team dresses a force of about 45 students and plays with a senior-dominated offensive line and a junior-controlled defense. The team will graduate about 17 seniors this school year.

Training for the 1982 football season began in June when Holley opened the high school weight room for the players. Full-time practice began in August. Holley stressed a weight training program, not only for football, but other sports as well. At the conclusion of this year's football season, Holley plans to implement an off-season practice in weight training.

"I put a lot of emphasis on the weights," Holley said. 'And, I always keep a very positive attitude around the boys. The weights help the boys become better athletes; it makes them stronger and quicker. It also gives them more confidence in themselves. Players that play hard can make up for any weak-ness within the team."

Assisting Holley with the 1982 Bulldogs are Graham Kilpatrick and Jack Meshaw. Wallace-Rose Hill drew a bye for Nov. 19 play-off action will host the winning


