DCAC Drive Goes Past Half-Way Mark

"There are still many of our citizens who have not yet been contacted about making a contribution to the Duplin County Arts Council," says Merle Creech, executive director, in reference to the 1983 fund drive. "We strongly appeal to those persons to send their checks directly and promptly to the Arts Council. We are grateful and appreciative of our community support thus far. Many volunteers have assisted and made possible the community canvass and in several areas an es-ecially

fine school participation." The goal this year is \$12,000 and as of April 8, over \$6,500 has been turned in. The reporting school totals are as follows: Rose Hill-Magnolia - \$14; Charity - \$93; N. Duplin Jr. High - \$28.50; N. Duplin Elementary - \$225.54; Kenansville Elementary - \$143.55; E.E. Smith Jr. High - \$204; Wallace-RH - \$92.02; Warsaw Jr. High - \$51.93; James Kenan High - \$33.03; Warsaw Elementary - \$678.92; B.F. Grady - \$434.36; Wallace Elementary - \$53; Chinquapin I - \$60.02; Chinquapin II - \$54.62.

"Wallace has done especially well as far as our towns have been concerned," says Mrs. Creech. More than twice the collected amount in Wallace last year has been raised for the 83-84 season. All monies collected are used for programming. The

position of Arts Council director is a county seat and therefore all collections are turned back to the citizens in the form of programs. "Most of our programs go into the schools," said Mrs. Creech. "This year has been exciting in that, for the first time, every one of the 17 schools has had at least two programs from the Arts Council. My concern towards meeting our goal of \$12,000 is that we will be able to bring quality arts at this frequency to the children in the county."

The schools are not the only places to see the DCAC at work. This year the CAR program has taken art into businesses. May senior citizens centers have had a visit from an AC artist. At the county fair, the quilt show, the school art display and the Green Grass Cloggers were sponsored by the AC.

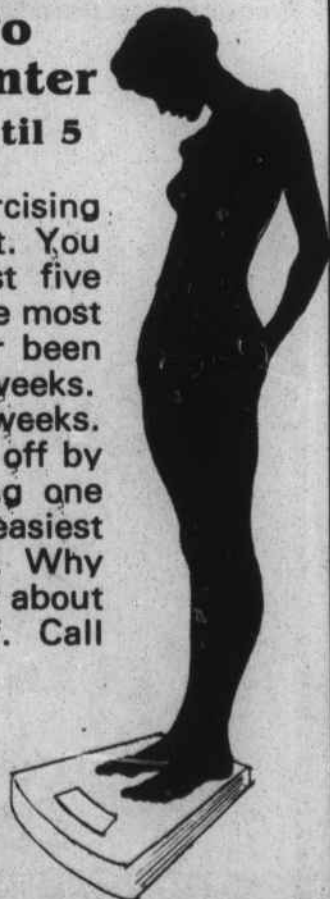
