Magnolia's town board voted to leave the depot as is until its present land lease expires in December. The town leases the land the depot sits on from the railroad company for \$100 a year. It also has a milliondollar liability insurance policy in force that costs \$136. It, too, expires in

December. Melba Laney, of the De-partment of Natural Resources and Community Development, will pursue possible funding sources to


