Good quality wrought iron furniture should carry a guarantee against rust. And kit is included.

Also check the furniture to make sure that there are smooth welds at the joints and that the decorations are

When you get your furniture home, keep it in top condition by hosing it down. or washing it with warm water and a mild detergent. Be sure to rinse.

Rub scratches or rust spots with steel wool and apply a metal primer coat. Be sure to use touch-up paint on chipped or scraped spots. And keep in mine that an annual coat of paste wax will help to preserve the color of the wrought-iron finish.
