The Lenoir County Board of Education is an elected school board and is responsible to the electorate who named them; therefore. we find it most appropriate that we hold some hearings before reaching any conclu-

"You may be assured that

the Lenoir County Board of Education will constantly assess the feelings of our people and will be giving them an opportunity to receive facts and to express themselves. We urge the citizens of the county school district to express their opinions on this issue to the county commissioners and to our legislators. The Board of Education will be most happy to hear suggestions from any of our school citizens. Smith said.


