Most Weeds Can Be Thinned Out

Sandspur and nutsedge, or "nutgrass," are plant pests that you can control in the home lawn with the proper chemical herbicides.
 The herbicides which can provide this control, along with control of emerged crabgrass, dallisgrass and goosegrass, are called arsenates, explain N. C. Agricultural Extension Service specialists.

The chemical names for the arsenated herbicides are abbreviated and are commonly called DSMA, MAMA, MSMA and CMA. All are liquid formulations available from most garden supply stores and lawn or turf suppliers.
 The materials can be applied conveniently with a sprayer that fits on the end of a garden hose.

THE FIRST MENTION IS IN GENESIS, CHAPTER 37, AN ACCOUNT OF JACOB'S GRIEF WHEN HE IS TOLD HIS SON JOSEPH HAS BEEN KILLED BY 'AN EVIL BEAST.' THE ACTUAL GARMENT WAS A COARSE CLOTH MADE OF CAMEL'S OR GOAT'S HAIR. IT WAS VERY ROUGH MATERIAL AND THEREFORE UNCOMFORTABLE TO WEAR. ONLY THE POOR WORE IT, HABITUALLY, AS AN EVERYDAY GARMENT, OR ROUGH HERDSMEN, OR RAGGED PROPHETS FROM THE WILDERNESS. IT PROBABLY BECAME A SYMBOL FOR SORROW AND MOURNING BECAUSE THESE ANCIENT PEOPLE MANIFESTED THEIR GRIEF BY BRINGING DISCOMFORT TO THE FLESH. TO HEIGHTEN THEIR ABSOLUTE DESPAIR THEY ALSO SPRINKLED ASHES UPON THEIR HEADS. WE ARE TOLD IN THE BOOK OF JONAH THAT THE PEOPLE OF THE GREAT CITY OF NINEVEH, FROM THE KING ON DOWN TO THE LEAST OF BEGGARS, DONNED SACKCLOTH AND POURED ASHES OVER THEIR REPENTANT HEADS.
