Faison's 200 Year Old Cemetery Converting To Prepetual Care

In the process of converting the 200-year-old Faison Cemetery to perpetual care, Ann Taylor of the Faison Cemetery Committee says she has discovered that a majority of the lots still belong to townspeople.

Over 80 percent of the families owning lots in the Faison Cemetery have been asked to join the perpetual care program. According to Taylor, the program would require a one-time payment for permanent care of the family or individual's cemetery lot. For example, a 20 feet by 20 feet cemetery lot would require a fee of \$300. Currently lot owners are charged \$8 a year for mowing at the cemetery. Taylor added, lot owners could still contribute yearly if they did not choose to join the perpetual care system. But, she said, yearly rates would be re-evaluated and increased.

"The older people in our town have expressed concern about care for their cemetery lots after they have died," Ann Taylor of the Faison Cemetery Committee said. "And, a lot of Faison's families are dying out and many times when the older family members die, the younger members are not aware of the system of care for the cemetery lot. The perpetual care system would eliminate these types of problems." A fund of \$30,000 is needed to establish the perpetual care program, Taylor said. The fund would be deposited and interest from the account would be payment to the town of Faison for the maintenance of the Cemetery. Approximately \$3,000 a year is needed for the maintenance and repair of the Cemetery.

"There are about 60 more families to be contacted," Taylor said. "We (Cemetery Committee) are in the pro-

cess of searching for their relatives. We meet and try to think of someone who knew the family well and might remember where the relatives have moved. We use telephone books from other communities to look up names and we talk to people on the streets of Faison to gather information about uncontacted families." At this point, Taylor said, more than 80 percent of the families with lots in the cemetery have been contacted. The goal is set to enroll 100 families or more in the perpetual care program and the committee has recently mailed 200 letters to lot owners in the Faison Cemetery.

"Some families we know have died out," Taylor said. "And, some families have left trust funds for maintenance of their cemetery lots. There are also various organizations and churches which have been paying for the care of many one-grave

lots, like those of the Confederate War soldiers buried in the Faison Cemetery. The older the cemetery gets, the more families will die out leaving no funds to maintain their lots." The cemetery is currently being surveyed to establish definite boundaries for lots, and Taylor said all unsold land within the boundaries would be deeded to the Town of Faison. The unsold lots in the



new addition of the Faison Cemetery are owned by L.E. Taylor. The original property was a donation by Isham Faison. The original land for the cemetery adjoined the property of the St. Gabriel's Episcopal Church. Today, the original building constructed as St. Gabriel's has been restored and houses an Episcopal congregation in Elizabethtown, Taylor said. The structure was moved

approximately two years ago from Faison where it had stood vacant for many years. The property on which the Episcopal Church stood was also donated by Isham Faison.

No deadlines have been established to complete the perpetual care project. Taylor added responses from local families have been favorable for the perpetual care project.

Whitley Honored For National Security Record
