Phil Denlinger, Duplin extension agent, said the event, called "Carolina Log'n' Demo," is the second biennial show held in Eastern North Carolina.

It is being held for loggers. equipment dealers, timber buyers and others for the entire mid-Atlantic region. We are fortunate that it is here in our state and near us. said Denlinger.

Sponsors of the demonstration are the N.C. Agricultural Extension Service and the N.C. Forestry Association.
