

Women's Fall Fashions

The look of casual sophistication will be an important one when it comes to women's fashions this fall. The prevailing style is a V-shaped silhouette coupled with versatile fabrics and deep, vibrant colors.

Among those popular fabrics are rich novelty satins and taffetas, nubby tweeds, brushed cottons and novelty knits.

Preventing White Clothes from Turning Gray

If some of your white clothes are beginning to look a bit gray around the edges, keep this in mind. Graying may be caused by overloading the washer, insufficient hot water, insufficient detergent, improper soaking or failure to use bleach.

Let's think about each one, starting with overloading the washer. When the washer is too full some articles may not receive proper flexing action. The solution is to follow the loading procedures outlined in the washer's operating instructions, and if need be, to reduce the size of the laundry load. Also, put articles of varying sizes together in each load.

Next, insufficient hot water. If the water temperature is too low, the detergent may not work efficiently. So set the water heater temperature control high enough so that the water is 140 degrees Fahrenheit at the faucet.

As mentioned, another leading cause of graying is too little detergent. Consult package directions and use the proper amounts. Heavier than average soil, hard water and large loads may call for extra detergent.

Improper soaking. If a fabric is soaked without detergent, or too little detergent,

Man Killed in Accident Near Kenansville

A two-truck collision near Kenansville Saturday morning left a Fayetteville woman injured and a Jacksonville man dead. Trooper K.A. Gardner of the State Highway Patrol said.

James Earl Fisher, 31, of Jacksonville, was driving a pickup truck west on N.C. 24 about half a mile east of Kenansville when it ran off the road and went out of control.

The truck veered back onto the pavement and skidded sideways across the centerline into another truck driven by James Melvin Revels, 27, of Route 2, Fayetteville.

Fisher died around 2 p.m. Saturday. Revel's wife Brenda was admitted to a hospital in Fayetteville for treatment of head injuries sustained when her head hit the unpadded dash of the 1965 pickup, Gardner said. Revel was not seriously injured.

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gent is used, released soil may become redeposited on the fabric. So, always use the proper amount of detergent in the soak water and make sure detergent is thoroughly dissolved.

The final cause of graying is failure to use a bleach. Therefore, to help whiten and brighten bleachable fabrics, occasionally use a chlorine bleach in the wash water.
