NC Fruit And Vegetable Growers Hold Trade Show

The North Carolina Fresh Vegetable Growers Association will be conducting their annual trade show and vegetable school Wednesday, Dec. 7. The event will be held at the Lenoir County Extension office and the Kinston Livestock Arena, and will begin at 8 a.m.

According to Phil Denlinger, assistant agricultural extension agent, This year's school will be better than ever. In the morning three concurrent sessions will be held. During one session topics concerning cucumbers will be discussed such as varieties, disease and insect control, and general cucumber culture. During another

session, many aspects of cabbage production will be taught. The third concurrent session will cover a variety of topics such as containerized transplants, dealing with compacted soil, and intensive vegetable production in North Carolina.

In the afternoon, topics on post-harvest handling and pest management will be covered.

The trade show will offer many exhibits and door prizes will be given away in the afternoon.
