During the 75-year history, the association has worked unremittingly within the system to achieve equal opportunity and justice for all citizens. In North Carolina, citizens


are urged to recognize the many achievements of the NAACP as a standard bearer for justice and join in its diamond jubilee celebration in 1984, Miller said.




