The Federal Reserve Bank at Richmond, Va., having in charge the general campaign for the Fifth Federal Reserve District, in a circular sent out broadcast, Oct. 11th says: "We Southerners are fighters, BUT—we are not bond buyers, to our Shame be it said Being Southerners, we can say it. Do you want the proof? There are 7,882,000 people, old and young, white and colored, in this District who did not buy a bond of either the Second or Third loan. 3,730,000 of them live in North and South Carolina. Similar conditions prevailed in the rest of the district, and a similar report has been made to the other states. The report of the Treasury Department shows that the South responded to the Third Loan, as to the number of subscribers, to a smaller extent than any other part of the country. This has been commented upon in a country wide publication.'


