"Long May It Wave."

"Tell your troubles to Foch, Haig
and Pershing," says President Wilson.

Now then let's notify Germany that
we are with President Wilson by filling
our quota for Fourth Liberty
Bonds.

Peace talk and Spanish influenza
should not interfere with the buying
of Liberty Bonds. Nothing will hasten
peace more than for the Fourth
Liberty Loan to be oversubscribed.

The people are solidly behind Presi-
dent Wilson in the stand he has taken
regarding peace. Too many of
our boys have paid the "Supreme Sacri-
fice" for us to take back now.

How in the name of all that is
holy can Germany expect to make
with the allies when her submarines
sink passenger ships and shell the life
boats on the very day that she sends
her first peace note to President Wil-
son?

Tomorrow night marks the closing
of the Fourth Liberty Loan campaign.
Have you bought your share of Lib-
erty Bonds? Isn't it possible for you
to buy ONE MORE? If so you owe
it to your government and yourself
to do so.

"If you want an armistice ask Foch
for it," says President Wilson. Right
you are, Mr. President. It would be
one of the most ungrateful steps and
worst kind of blunder to grant any
kind of armistice that Gen. Foch
would not put his O. K. to.

Score one more for "Shirt Sleeves
Diplomacy." Thank God it is never
necessary to misunderstand American
diplomacy. The words used by our
diplomats are never clothed in subter-
fuge, but their meaning is always
clear and easily understood.

If Germany thinks she can bring
about a disagreement between Amer-
ica and her allies she is very much
mistaken. Rest assured that Presi-
dent Wilson is not going to grant any
kind of armistice or grant any kind
of terms that is not in perfect har-
mony with our allies.

President Wilson plainly tells Max-
imilian that he will have nothing to
do with the Kaiser or the "Imperial"
German Government. In his reply he
plainly tells the German people that
they must first have to rid themselves
of the Hohenzollern outfit before the
allies will make any kind of peace
treaty.

We sincerely trust, and believe that
this will be the last opportunity you
will ever have to aid your Govern-
ment by buying bonds. We believe
that the war will be over before we
are called upon for another big, popu-
lar loan. Then get busy before it is
too late, and show that Government
that you believe in it by buying Lib-
erty Bonds.

When voting next November be
sure and vote FOR the six months
school amendment. It brings the
blush of shame and remorse to the
cheek of every "Tar Heel" to be told
that the major portion of our soldier
boys were unable to sign their name
to the muster roll, and had to make
an X instead. North Carolinians are
entitled to, and should receive as
great educational facilities as the citi-
zens of any other State. If you
want to see your children and your
neighbor's children better educated,
vote FOR the amendment.

Press dispatches from the front
under date of October 8th, say:
"American troops from North and
South Carolina and Tennessee under
command of General Lewis, in heavy
fighting northeast of St. Quentin,
captured the villages of Brancourt
and Fremont, (the latter four miles
northeast of Beaurevoir,) advancing
more than three miles from their in-
itial positions." Don't you think that
you should do everything in your
power to back up these boys? You
say that you are proud of them.

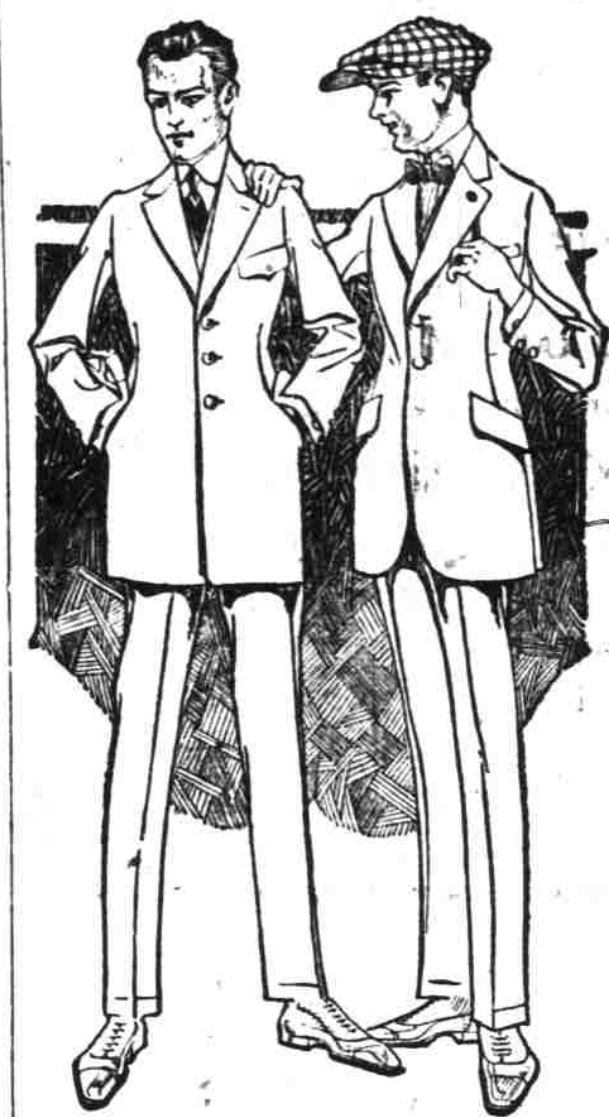

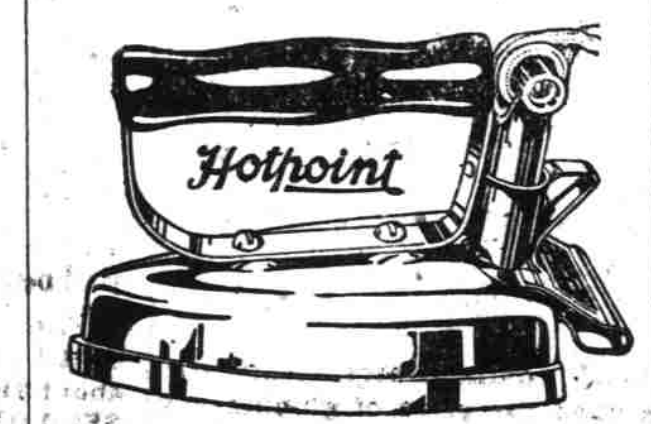
