Mesdames. E. E. Fulton of Savannah, Ga., and P. A. Ryan, of New Orleans, are running the Pace House this summer.

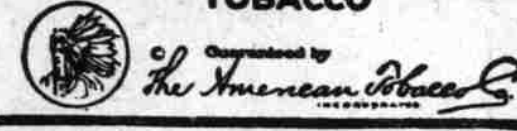
Belle Besseliew, of Savannah, is to be at home at the Pace House this summer.

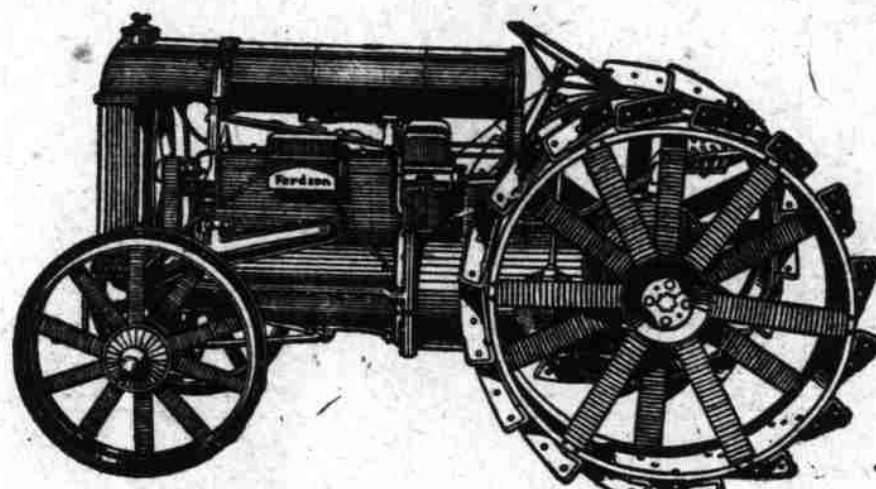
