What Keeps Bird in Air.
The manipulation of birds' wings has been analyzed to a certain degree by an ultra-rapid camera invented by C. Francis Jenkins of Washington. Mr. Jenkins has shown the exact motion of a pigeon's wings. His pictures demonstrated that the back stroke, when the wings touch over the head, propels the bird, while the forward stroke, when the wings meet under the body, sustains the pigeon in the air.

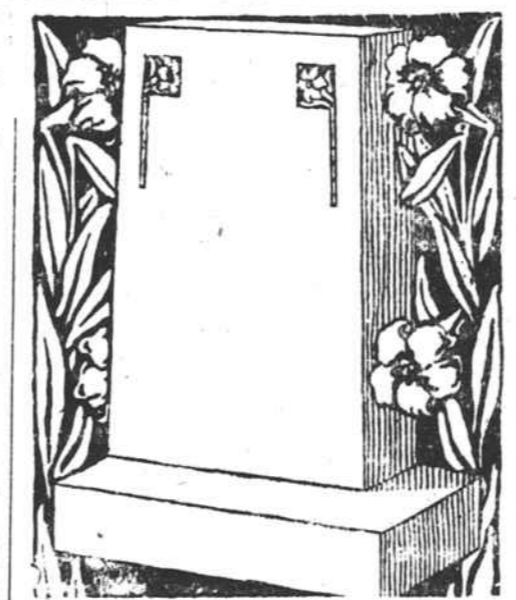

EGYPTIAN KINGS CLASH OVER THE HOLY CARPET

Controversy Causes Controversy Britain Must Settle.

King Fuad of Egypt is having a lively conflict with his brother, King Hussein of the Hedjaz, over the Holy Carpet.

It does not mean that Fuad has "won the carpet" for any length of time. It simply means that the Egyptian monarch insists that a detachment of Egyptian doctors shall accompany the annual pilgrimage of the pilgrims with their Holy Carpet to Mecca.

Hussein argues that the Hedjaz possesses excellent doctors of its own, and desires no Egyptian importations. In the event of the controversy he is in agreement with King Hussein in appealing to Great Britain for a solution.

At the season of the annual pilgrimage to Mecca, the Egyptian government habitually organizes a considerable medical detachment to assure the safety of the pilgrims on their journey. This year the usual detachment was followed and the equivalent of the personnel of two field hospitals was enlisted. King Hussein, however, suddenly declared against the Egyptian physicians.

King Hussein holds a high card in his hand in the dispute in the fact that the Holy Carpet, an indispensable feature of the Mecca ceremonies, resides in a mosque. The fact, therefore, has gone forth, "No doctors, no carpet." The subject has aroused the whole of the two countries and has become the subject of formal diplomatic negotiations.

Head of Zoo Says Polar Bears Like Hot Weather

Philadelphia.—Polar bears sitting on a pile of ice, being fed ice cream with the thermometer soaring above 90, is a peculiar sight, according to Emerson Browne, superintendent of the Philadelphia zoological gardens. "None of our animals suffer from the heat to any great extent," said Mr. Browne. "People come here expecting to see some of them all wrapped up in cold compresses to prevent them from the heat. We just let them alone, and nature takes care of the bear."

They not only don't mind it, but they actually seem to revel in it. It is the one time of the year when keepers can let all the animals out in their yards without fear of some tropical pest catching pneumonia. Those from the northern climes roll over and sleep, not even disturbed by the crowds of visitors who stand outside and gaze in with pity. And as for the rest, they regain all their former youth and vigor, lost when they left the sunny forests of Africa and southern Asia.

Famous Washington Elm at Cambridge Is Dead

Cambridge, Mass.—The "Washington elm" is dead. The official demise of the famed tree beneath which Washington took command of the Continental army was announced by Dr. C. R. Sargent, director of the Arnold Arboretum of Harvard university, in a letter to Mayor Edward W. Quinn of Cambridge.

"All signs of life have now gone from the Washington elm," Doctor Sargent wrote, "and there is no chance of its being alive until the autumn. So far as I am concerned it can be cut down at any time."

Mayor Quinn, it is learned, is eager to raise a fund from the school children of the country for a shaft to mark the historic spot. The trunk probably will be cut into small bits to be distributed as souvenirs among the citizens of the country. An offshoot of the Washington elm was planted on the Cambridge common 40 years ago and now is flourishing.

Hastily Built House Stands Test of Time

Hanover, Pa.—Erected fifty years ago in ten hours, the two-story brick dwelling at 583 South Prince street has stood the test of time and is still in good condition. It contains eight rooms. The idea of building the house from sunup to sundown was conceived by Dr. Benjamin Mishler. One hundred men worked on the house, finishing it in ten hours. Doctor Mishler's son moved his furniture in and ate supper in the new house in the same evening.

Russia Adopts Gregorian Calendar.

Moscow.—This year will be the first that Russia will celebrate Christmas simultaneously with the rest of the world. The council of commissioners fixed upon ten church holidays to be observed according to the Gregorian calendar.

Injunction to Keep Noisy Hounds Quiet

Spiritualists attending a camp-meeting near Vicksburg, Mich., have been driven almost to distraction by the howling of ten hounds on the farm of Almon Shears, near by. The Spiritualists asked that the dogs be removed from the farm, but the court only issued an injunction ordering Shears to keep the dogs as quiet as possible.
