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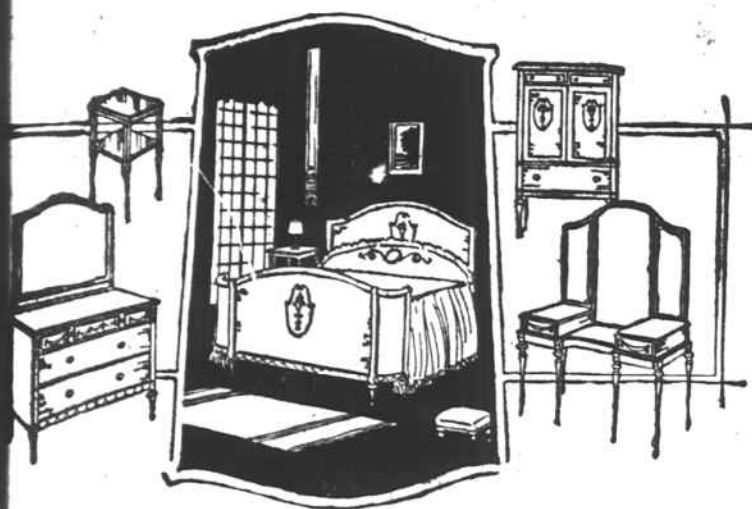

1803 Tennessee "Blue  
Law" Perils Sunday Gas

Nashville, Tenn.—Sunday "blue  
laws" more than 100 years old may be  
invoked in Tennessee to prevent op-  
eration of Sunday business.

This is seen by keen observers in  
the decision of the Supreme court re-  
cently in ruling that a person operat-  
ing a gasoline filling station "is a  
merchant," and liable under the old  
statute.

The law invoked was passed by the  
state legislature in 1803. Violation  
carries a fine of \$3 for each offense,  
one-half of which goes to the state  
and the other half to the person mak-  
ing the complaint.

The old statute was revived by the  
Supreme court in making a decision  
in the case of a filling station op-  
erator who sought an injunction to  
restrain a constable from interfering  
with him in the operation of his busi-  
ness. The constable had arrested the  
filling station operator 50 times. The  
petition for the injunction was denied  
in Chancery court and the lower court  
sustained when appealed to the Su-  
preme court.
