The new audit of the town of Tryon for the year ending May 31, 1926. will soon be completed, and it is hoped by the next issue of this paper to give Mayor Green's full report as shown by the audit.

In my paragraphs of last week was an error in the statement. It should have read that the operating expenses for the town of Tryon for the year ending May 31, 1925, was \$4,440.37. \$5,440.37. The sum of \$4,440.37 covered all administrative expense for the year referred to, including salary ness manager. Cost of keeping all the accounts, collecting the town taxes, election expenses, cost of atsalary of chief of police, watchman, and sundry expenses. The next morning, as he wanted to go home and when they roused him he turned on the gas and looked in the glass and saw his whiskers were gone. He called down through the tube, "You have called the wrong man," and went back to bed. I said to the man who wanted to be mayor, "It is evident they have called the wrong man." This is about the capacity of

many men who think they can do something much better than the man who has had experience and knowl. edge of his job.

I was appointed chairman of a committee by the president of the Chamber of Commerce to see if the Chamber of Commerce could assist in devising means to increase the revenue of the town. A number of suggestions, among them that a complete ap of the town be made showing the property lines, also the location of all sewer and water pipe lines; that the water system be adopted and water used be charged by the amount used, were adopted. Then we recommended that citizens be notified regarding the filling out of personal tax form and the penalty attached for not complying with the law in this regard. Soon after someone knocked up he pointed to the sheet in the indow, shook his fist, then shook his head, as much as to say he didn't pay personal taxes. Another man asked me how much commission t received. Everybody that looked in scowled. Well, I don't suppose paying taxes or even filling a return has ver been popular. When we read or their journeying to Rome 2,000 years ago to be taxed, I don't suppose it was any joy ride.

Ducklings Fattened for

Market Are Always Best The ducklings to be marketed should be fattened for two weeks before killing on a ration made of three parts, by weight, of corn meal, two parts of low-grade flour or middlings, one part of bran, one-half part of beef scrap, with 8 per cent grit and 10 per cent green feed. Feed this mash three times daily, or use a mash of three parts corn meal, one part low-grade wheat flour, one part bran, 5 per cent beef scrap and 3 per cent oyster shell, with the green feed and grit added.

The green feed is sometimes left out of the ration during the last seven days of fattening, as it tends to color the meat and may produce a slightly flabby rather than a firm flesh; however, it is easier to keep the ducklings in good feeding condition on a mash containing green feed.

Maryland Chicken. Two 21/2 1b. 1 cup water Fine bread crumbs (broilers) Pepper 1-3 cup butter 1 tsp. salt Dash pepper 1 cup evaporated

2 bbsp. flouf Dress, clean and cut up chickens. Sprinkle with salt and pepper, dip in crumbs, egg, and crumbs. Place in a well-oiled dripping pan, and bake twenty minutes in a 450-degree F. oven, then reduce the temperature to 350 degrees F. and cook until tender, about twenty minutes longer. Baste every ten minutes during cooking with % cup melted butter. Remove to platter and pour around a cream sauce made of fat in dripping pan, the flour, diluted milk, salt and pepper.

Asparagus en Fri. % cup water 1 bunch fresh 8 thap. butter asparagus rounds toast poached eggs 1 tsp. salt 4 cup evaporated Pepper 1/2 cup grated cheese

Prepare a white sauce of the butter flour, salt, pepper and diluted milk. Cook the asparagus in hoiling salted water. Drain and add to white sauce. Place a poached egg in center of toast. Pour asparagus around the egg and sprinkle grated cheese over top of all. Serve at once. Serves six.
