BERRY'S WEEKLY COLUMN

The new audit of the town of Tryon for the year ending May 31, 1926, will soon be completed, and it is hoped by the next issue of this paper to give Mayor Green's full report as shown by the audit.

In my paragraphs of last week was an error in the statement. It should have read that the operating expenses for the town of Tryon for the year ending May 31, 1925, was \$4,440.37. The item read by an error of mine, \$5,440.37. The sum of \$4,440.37 covered all administrative expense for the year referred to, including salary of the mayor, who also acted as business manager...

I was talking to a man recently and he said, "I would just like to be mayor of this town." Well, I hadn't heard any great clamor of our citizens for the man to act as mayor. So I asked what experience he had had in municipal government. He admitted he hadn't had any. Then I asked him if he had studied the town charter. He said he didn't know the town had a charter. I then asked him if he knew how the taxes were divided regarding town and county and how the budget was made up. He never heard of a budget and didn't know what it was.

I told him he reminded me of an old chap that came to town, and of glory of the old man was the long crop of spinach he grew on his chin. The night the boys in the town set him full, and after he retired they cut off his glory from his chin. The old man had left a call for five o'clock. The next morning, as he wanted to go home and when they roused him he turned on the gas and looked in the glass and saw his whiskers were gone. He called down through the tube, "You have called the wrong man," and went back to bed. I said to the man who wanted to be mayor, "It is evident they have called the wrong man." This is about the capacity of

many men who think they can do something much better than the man who has had experience and knowledge of his job.

I was appointed chairman of a committee by the president of the Chamber of Commerce to see if the Chamber of Commerce could assist in devising means to increase the revenue of the town. A number of suggestions, among them that a complete map of the town be made showing the property lines, also the location of all sewer and water pipe lines; that the water system be adopted and water used be charged by the amount used, were adopted. Then we recommended that citizens be notified regarding the filling out of personal tax form and the penalty attached for not complying with the law in this regard. Then a bright idea struck me—and you all know there is nothing so valuable and enjoyable as a bright idea. It kept me awake nights. I hadn't had a bright idea for centuries. So I put the idea at work. It was to put a card in my office window advising the passersby where they could get blanks to fill out for personal taxes. Well, the idea soon began to work. A man stuck his head in the door and asked if I was a tax assessor. Soon after someone knocked on the window, and when I looked up he pointed to the sheet in the window, shook his fist, then shook his head, as much as to say he didn't pay personal taxes. Another man asked me how much commission I received. Everybody that looked in scowled. Well, I don't suppose paying taxes or even filling a return has ever been popular. When we read of their journeying to Rome 2,000 years ago to be taxed, I don't suppose it was any joy ride.

Know Your Cook Book, Girls, Advice of Diva

Cooking, in her estimation, is a fine art which is rapidly being lost. "Doubtless one of the big reasons for this condition is that modern young men don't expect the girls they marry to know much about cooking," said Miss Maxwell.

- Maryland Chicken. Two 3 1/2 lb. chickens, 3 eggs, 5 lbs. bread crumbs, Salt, 1-3 cup butter, 1 cup evaporated milk, 1 tsp. salt, 1/2 cup diluted Dash pepper with 2 tbsp. flour.

Dress, clean and cut up chickens. Sprinkle with salt and pepper, dip in crumbs, egg, and crumbs. Place in a well-oiled dripping pan, and bake twenty minutes in a 450-degree F. oven, then reduce the temperature to 350 degrees F. and cook until tender, about twenty minutes longer. Baste every ten minutes during cooking with 1/2 cup melted butter. Remove to platter and pour around a cream sauce made of fat in dripping pan, the flour, diluted milk, salt and pepper.

Ducklings Fattened for Market Are Always Best

The ducklings to be marketed should be fattened for two weeks before killing on a ration made of three parts, by weight, of corn meal, two parts of low-grade flour or middlings, one part of bran, one-half part of beef scrap, with 3 per cent grit and 10 per cent green feed. Feed this mash three times daily, or use a mash of three parts corn meal, one part low-grade wheat flour, one-half part bran, 5 per cent beef scrap and 3 per cent oyster shell, with the green feed and grit added. The green feed is sometimes left out of the ration during the last seven days of fattening, as it tends to color the meat and may produce a slightly flabby rather than a firm flesh; however, it is easier to keep the ducklings in good feeding condition on a mash containing green feed.

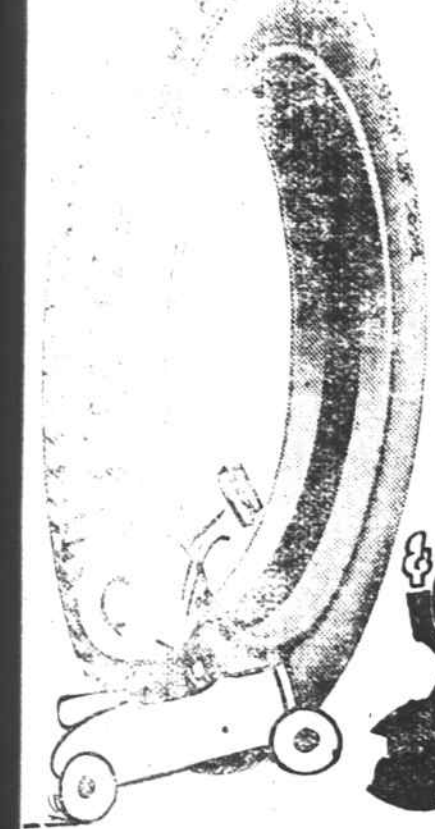
