THE BUYING OF AUTOMOBILES DRAINING THE SOUTH OF ITS WEALTH

Recent compiled reports showed that the money spent by the South for automobiles, annually equaled two thirds of the proceeds of the cotton crop in the South.

This is said to account for the shortage of money in the South and the difficulty of raising local capital for home developments and the failure of banks and the stagnant condition of business in some parts of the South.

Besides the purchase of automobiles, the mail order houses of the North secure thousands of dollars from the South, from which the South derives no benefit from taxes, licenses or labor.

If the South is going ahead with her developments and her business prosperity, she must develop industrial industries, home manufacture and rely on her own home merchants.

Until we can balance our trade condition with the North and East, the South must suffer and prosperity and wealth be crippled.

CHEVROLET OUTPUT DURING JUNE 77,241

The gigantic manufacturing organization of the Chevrolet Motor Co. rose to new production in heights during June when it built 77,241 passenger cars and trucks, a greater number of units than the company ever had produced in a single month.

No other manufacturer of modern three-speed transmission automobiles has approached this production which culminates a series of monthly production records established by Chevrolet.

The aggregate production for the first half of 1926 was 384,573 cars and trucks. During the first half of 1925, Chevrolet's greatest year, the company produced 249,834 units.

The surprising growth of the Chevrolet Motor Co. is indicated by the fact that the production during the first half of 1926 equals the entire production during the first seven and one-half years of the company's history.

Details of the company's recently announced \$10,000,000 expansion program are going forward and completion of this project will give the company a production capacity during 1927 of one million Chevrolets.

Plans Made For Sunday School Convention

Plans have been made for holding the annual Polk County Sunday School Convention at Cooper's Gap Baptist Church, seven miles south of Chimney Rock, N. C. on Saturday and Sunday, July 17 and 18.

These officers have announced that they have secured as outside speakers for the convention Mr. D. W. Sims, Raleigh, General Superintendent of prominent pastors and Sunday-School Association, and Miss Myra Batchelder, Spartanburg, S. C. General Superintendent of the South Carolina Sunday School Association.

The program for the convention will include addresses and discussions of various phases of modern Sunday School work, the object being to make it possible for workers in all departments of the Sunday School to get help from the convention.

Announcement is also made by the officers in charge of the convention that, following a custom started three years ago, a pennant will be presented to the Sunday School having in the convention the largest number of representatives, sixteen years of age and over, according to the number of miles traveled.

PRODUCE LATE VEGETABLES ADVISES HORTICULTURIST

Raleigh, N. C. July 7—With the coming of general rains, the vegetable garden may still be made productive and profitable.

"About the first things to do," says Robert Schmidt, vegetable specialist at State College, "is plant some snap beans at once and don't forget to continue planting that a continuous supply may be had. If there are no pole beans, some of the bush varieties like the Improved Bush will produce a good crop in the late fall."

Prof. Schmidt also suggests the planting of more sweet potatoes in eastern Carolina. These may be taken from the prouts or from vine cuttings in taking vine cuttings, however, more than two should be raised from each plant.

Another important thing is to keep tillup cultivation. If the rains continue, grass and weeds will grow rapidly. Cultivation should be continued often enough to keep the face broken and loose and the weeds killed out. Insects and disease work havoc in the garden during late summer, says Prof. Schmidt. A careful watch should be kept for such trouble and measures taken to control the pests before they do much damage.
